ten days, following which all delinquents will be arrested and brought into court. Attorney Langer believes that the warning will suffice in a large percentage of the cases. He quotes School No. 6 in the Crown Butte district as one example. The farmers all living within a radius of a mile and a half from the school, are parents of 27 children, ranging from 8 to 15 years of age, who are not in school. It is the rural schools that are mostly affected, although some of the towns and villages are delinquent. At Hebron there are 22 children not in school, according to the figures of the state's attorney.

WINDOW SMASHERS ARE STILL BUSY

Laginee Broke Glass in the City Jail to Speak to His Pal.

The windows of the large cell in the city jail were again smashed last night, and the brick wall at the rear of the jail partially destroyed, after having been repaired yesterday. The windows were smashed on Sunday night and a hole dug part way through the brick wall.

Andy Lagiene, a transient, arrested yesterday afternoon on the charge of vagrancy, confessed to having done the damage. He stated this morning that his "pal" had been outside the window during the night, and in order to speak to him had broken the windows.

Laginee pleaded guilty to the charges of vagrancy and disorderly conduct when arraigned in municipal court this morning before Judge William Rasmussen, and received a sentence of sixty days at hard labor in the county jail. Three other drunks, arraigned this morning in police court, pleaded guilty to the charges and were given suspended sentences on condition they leave the city. They left.

LARGE YIELD IS OBTAINED

Northland Township Farmers Obtain Over 20,000 Bushels of Grain From 740 Acres.

A total of 20,850 bushels of grain on an area of about 740 acres, was the yield obtained this year by John Fribula and his son Joseph, of Northland township in this county. Joseph Fribula spent the day in East Grand Forks attending to business matters. He is very enthusiastic over the results of the past season, and over the prospects for the future. About 7,500 bushels of wheat, 6,000 bushels of oats, 6,000 bushels of barley and 350 bushels of flax, and about 50 tons of hay is the record made by the two men this year.
