EAST GRAND FORKS. LICENSE EXPIRATION CAUSES EARLIER CLOSING IN EAST GRAND FORKS THAN AT CROOKSTON; FEW DAYS OF GRACE

If the saloon licenses did not expire in East Grand Forks on Tuesday night, the saloons in the city could remain open until Saturday night instead of being forced to close Tuesday night.

The attitude has been taken by many that the saloons must go out of business exactly six months after a county option election, whether the licenses have expired or not. Others hold that it is not necessary to close the saloons until six months after the final count has been canvassed, which would give the saloons the privilege of doing business until November 27.

Crookston saloons will do business until November 27. Licenses in Crookston do not expire until after that date, and they will remain open until next Saturday night at 11 o'clock.

This is the last Saturday night for the saloons in this city.

GETS SENTENCE FOR LARCENY

Edward Murphy convicted of theft of \$5.76 from Anton Hagen in Local Saloon Last Night.

Edward Murphy, a transient, charged with petit larceny, pleaded guilty in municipal court this morning before Judge William Rasmussen, and was sentenced to 90 days at hard labor in the county jail.

Murphy was convicted of the theft of \$5.76 from Anton Hagen in the Christiania saloon last evening. While standing at the bar in an intoxicated condition, Hagen dropped his money, \$5.76, to the floor. Murphy picked it up and refused to return it, and he was arrested.

Murphy stated that he had picked the money off the floor to safeguard it for Hagen, but the judge was of the opinion that he was not a good guardian, and gave him the jail sentence.

Murphy has a jail record behind him in the local court, having appeared several times on the charges of drunkenness and vagrancy.
