

PRESIDENT TO DEFINE METHOD OF RAISING CASH

Wilson, After Conference With Fitzgerald, Determines on Course.

OPPOSES THE ADVICE OF OTHERS

House, Charged with Originating Bill, May Take Offense.

Washington, Nov. 22.—President Wilson will indicate in his annual message to congress which he is now writing, how, in his opinion money necessary to provide national defense, as proposed by the administration, may be raised.

This is indicated as a result of last night's conference between the president and Representative Fitzgerald of New York, chairman of the house appropriations committee.

Some of the president's advisers, however, have told him that inasmuch as the house has sole authority to originate revenue legislation, it ought not to appear to usurp that power.

Economic Blockade Only Measure to Cure King Constantine, Says British Press; May be Tardy

London, Nov. 22.—The informal commercial blockade of Greece is described as "the first installment of the only medicine that can cure King Constantine's affliction," by the Pall Mall Gazette, which adds:

"The only argument to which Constantine is amenable is demonstration that the allies are armed with more than amiability, and are ready and able to punish those who play tricks with them."

DR. SHAW TO QUIT PRESIDENCY FOR FIELD CAMPAIGN

LEADERS OF GREEK PARTY HOLD MEET

TWO TURK CHIEFS TO BE HANGED

40,000 CHILDREN SEE LIBERTY BELL

About 100,000 People Pass Before Relic in St. Louis Yesterday.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 22.—With a sunrise prayer, forty thousand school children paid homage to the liberty bell here at 6:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Exclusive of the children, a parade of the Missouri national guard and every other military and civic organization in the city passed in review before the historic bell.

TURKISH TRANSPORT IS SUNK BY MINE; 500 ON SHIP GO TO THEIR DEATH

London, Nov. 22.—Sinking of a Turkish transport which was carrying 500 soldiers across the Sea of Marmora, is reported in a message from Zurich, forwarded to Amsterdam by the central news agency. The message says that the transport struck a mine and nearly all on board were drowned.

BRITISH OFFICERS IN UNITED STATES

A local British officer explained that the two military men are in Chicago to assume their duties now in the United States on inspection, purchasing and other detached service, for immediate duty at the front.

ZEPPELIN HAD MADE ONLY ONE FLIGHT

Copenhagen, Nov. 22.—The Zeppelin Z-18, which was recently destroyed by an explosion at Tondern, Prussia, had made only a single trip westward, over the island of Sylt. The shed which housed it had just been completed at the time of the disaster.

COMMERCIAL BLOCKADE OF GREECE MEANS IMMEDIATE DECISION BY HELLENIC KING; SOME QUARTERS ALREADY REPORT SUCCESS

IMPRESS ATHENS BY ACTION; FEAR NO BAD EFFECTS

The Commercial Blockade Brings to Greece Force of Entente's Demand.

VENIZELOS MEN ACCUSE KING

Declare Lack of Foresight Has Brought on Present Condition.

Paris, Nov. 22.—Declaration of the commercial blockade of Greece by the entente powers has produced a marked impression in Athens, particularly as it was unexpected.

An Athens dispatch to the Petit Journal says newspaper organs of the Greek government accuse the allies, especially Great Britain, of driving Greece into the war by harsh measures.

These papers assert Greece has given up the project that she intends to maintain a policy of benevolent neutrality, and has had no thought of taking hostile steps.

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Serbian Army Retreats Into Montenegro is Report

Paris, Nov. 22.—An official statement received at the Montenegrin consulate indicates that part of the Serbian army has retreated into Montenegro, joining with Montenegrin troops on the Lim river.

Embassy Wants Men Released

London, Nov. 22.—The American embassy has requested the British government to release Emil Mielchke and Herman Krauss of Chicago, naturalized Americans of German birth, who were taken from the Norwegian-American liner Kristianiafjord when it was detained recently at Kirkwall.

British Forces Arrive At City of Monastir

Geneva, Nov. 22.—Via Paris—Press dispatches from Bucharest say that British forces have arrived at the Serbian city of Monastir and are being reinforced.

PLANS UNIFICATION OF WESTERN WORLD



Gen. Maximo B. Gonzalez, leader of the liberal party in Honduras, one time vice president, secretary of state, secretary of war and of agriculture and reputed protector of American interests in the Central American republics has let it be known that he is in Washington with a plan for the unification of the Americas, which he is understood to have discussed with the state department.

Berlin, Nov. 22.—(By wireless to Saville)—The Italians have met with a severe defeat in Tripoli at the hands of Arams, according to telegrams from Constantinople, says the Overseas News agency.

Austro-Germans Lose Town in Short Time

London, Nov. 22.—The recapture of Carpatyok by the Russians was accompanied by the capture of the town of Novopazar, an Austro-German town, which has been the Serbian capital since Nish fell into the hands of the Bulgarians.

ENGLAND HAS NOT INDICATED THAT SATISFACTORY GUARANTEES HAVE BEEN MADE; SERBIAN OPERATIONS STOPPED

Rotterdam, Nov. 22.—The Cologne Gazette reports that a great offensive movement has been initiated at the Dardanelles by the allies.

London, Nov. 22.—Rumors of last week that the entente allies had determined to compel Greece to repudiate all hints that she might interfere with the passage of allied troops across her territory have been substantiated by the inauguration of the commercial blockade.

Some dispatches from Athens go so far as to say this already has been attained as the result of Earl Kitchener's conference with King Constantine, and that the earl received assurances of a satisfactory nature.

The British government, however, has not yet intimated that Greece has complied to the demands of the allies.

Greece is described as a prey of conflicting emotions—the fear of Germany, whose military successes have brought the Balkan war theater nearer, and her natural sympathy for the cause of the allies—are dictating opposite paths out of her present difficult neutrality.

Some newspapers regard the blockade of Greece as a violation of the international law. It has caused a profound impression upon which immediate action is predicted.

Important Gain on Isonzo Battle Front

Rome, Nov. 22.—Italian troops have made an important advance on the Isonzo front, especially on the heights northwest of Gorizia, according to the official statement issued at the headquarters of the general staff.

3,000 More Serbs Are Taken Prisoners

Berlin, Nov. 22.—The capture of more than 3,000 Serbians is announced by the German war office. Five cannon and four machine guns were taken in field operations, while in Novopazar an arsenal of 50 large mortars and eight cannon of an old type were found.

Serbian Town of Novopazar Taken

Berlin, Nov. 22.—By wireless to Saville.—The Serbian town of Novopazar, which is only 25 miles from the Montenegrin frontier, has been taken by the Germans. This announcement was made by the war office, which reported the capture of 4,400 Serbians.

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
