
## MUCH WHEAT IS STILL IN SHOCK

Regina, Sask., Nov. 26.—Between 125,000,000 and 130,000,000 bushels of wheat have been shipped out of Saskatchewan to the present time, three railroads handling this amount, and if weather conditions continue satisfactory, it is expected that the bulk of the crop will be moved out this fall.

R. W. Drew, general freight agent of the C. P. R., has reports covering the crop situation which show that threshing operations still are in progress in some sections of the province. Fifteen per cent of the grain in the district between Yorkton and the Manitoba boundary remains to be threshed, while ten per cent of the grain in the western section of the province remains to be pouched out.

A local grain commission house estimates that 50,000,000 more bushels of grain will be handled on the lakes this season. Already 150,000,000 bushels have been handled from Canadian ports.

THE ZEBRA IS EXPLAINED. (Popular Science.) Abbott Thayer, a prominent American artist, has devoted many years to a study of the colors of animals.
