BLACK 'STUMP' IS PREY OF HUNTERS Local Hunters Haul 200 Pound Bear Over Four Miles Thru Woods. Albert and Anchor Worden of East Grand Forks returned to this city yesterday morning from a hunting trip about 23 miles east of Black Duck, Minn., and the results of their prowess arrived in the city last evening. On Thanksgiving morning the two men started out to bring down a deer or two. Eleven o'clock came and no deer had given them a chance to earn a pot roast, and they began the homeward hike. About four miles and a half from their camp, Anchor said to Albert, pointing a short distance to the front, "what is that blackened stump doing in these woods?" They went a little closer to investigate, when the stump began to move. Not wishing to take any chances with a moving "stump," both of the men emptied their guns at it. A terrific roar that could be heard for miles answered the reports of the rifles, and a huge black bear, weighing 200 pounds, rose on its haunches and advanced a few feet in the direction of the men, and fell dead. But the men were still a long distance from their camp, and no way of hauling a 200 pound hulk through the woods. After attempting to drag the bear about half a mile, a rude sled was rigged up, and the carcass loaded on. Four hours later, two tired men and dead bear arrived at the camp. The bear will be skinned and the fur used to make a rug. Two large deer were also brought home by the hunters.

SECOND SEMESTER IS BEGUN Winter Short Course Begun Today for Benefit of Those Who Attend School Short Time. The second semester of East Grand Forks city schools began this morning with a much larger enrollment than in the first part of the year. The winter short course also commenced today, giving pupils who have not been able to attend school the full term a chance to get the benefit of a full year. Miss Jane Boudin, the school nurse from Duluth, sent here by the state board of health to investigate conditions in the local schools, has spent the past few days visiting at the homes of those who have been quarantined, and offering suggestions as to the best methods to overcome the spreading of the disease. This week a personal examination of each pupil in the schools will be made. Superintendent Lurton has given the pupils an opportunity to visit a doctor and undergo vaccination. If this is not complied with soon, it is probable that more emphatic steps will be taken to compel vaccination. Close Was Quiet. The closing of the saloons at Crookston Saturday evening was a quiet affair, the city observing the passing of the liquor business with little unusual display. Only a few arrests on minor charges were made. Johnson Baby Died Saturday. The infant of Mr. and Mrs. P. T. Johnson of Minnesota Point died Saturday morning, after being ill a short time. Mr. Johnson is the owner of a farm a few miles south of East Grand Forks.
