Wilmington, Del., Nov. 30.—An explosion, the worst in the Dupont plant in thirty years, occurred here today. Reports indicate that the explosion was terrific. At least 20 and probably more men, were killed, it is said. Officials of the Dupont company started for the scene of the disaster at 1:30 p. m. to make an investigation. The greatest confusion and excitement prevails at the powder yard.

300 ENTOMBED IN MINE EXPLOSION

Fayetteville, Va., Nov. 30.—An explosion in mine No. 2 of the Bloomer Coal and Coke company for a time entraped 300 miners. Two hundred and fifty men escaped or were rescued a short time after the explosion. Three explosions are said to have occurred in rapid succession. It is believed the men still in the mine are alive, and may be rescued.
