Frank H. T. Ritchie of International Committee Speaks on Boys' Work at Noon Meeting.

Frank H. T. Ritchie, boys' work secretary of the international committee of the Y. M. C. A., is in Grand Forks today conferring with local association officers and workers. At noon today he addressed a meeting of the Y. M. C. A. directors on "Some Things New in Boys' Work." At 4:30 o'clock this afternoon he will hold a conference with the boys' work committee.

In his address this noon, Mr. Ritchie emphasized the importance of boys' work. He said that the Y. M. C. A. of the future will be a co-operative agency in working for the development of the boyhood of the community. The church, the school, the home and the municipality now recognize the importance of this work and are directing it in various ways. The association must co-operate with these agencies, Mr. Ritchie declared.

Lafferty is being held on the charge of vagrancy pending an investigation. He will be arraigned in municipal court tomorrow morning before Judge William Raamussen. This will be the first time that police court has been held since Saturday when two men were arraigned.
