BILL TO CONTINUE WAR REVENUE LAW

Washington, Dec. 8.—After a conference with Secretary McAdoo yesterday, Chairman Kitchin of the house ways and means committee announced that the democrats would put through congress before the Christmas recess a bill to continue the emergency war revenue law which would expire by limitation December 31. This is estimated to raise more than \$80,000,000 annually. The emergency tax law probably will be extended for a year.

East Grand Forks FIVE ARE SENT TO COUNTY JAIL

First Time in Several Days That Local Jail Has Been Inhabited.

Municipal court regained a little of its old aspect of the days before the ousting of saloons from East Grand Forks this morning, when nine prisoners appeared before Judge William Rasmussen for trial on minor offenses. This was the first day in several that the local baillie has been occupied.

Oscar Lee, formerly a regular roomer at the city jail and at the county jail at Crookston, appeared before Judge Rasmussen this morning on the charge of drunkenness. He pleaded guilty to the offense, and was sentenced to sixty days in the county jail at hard labor. Lee refused to state where he obtained the liquor, but it is supposed that he obtained it from some one who had laid in a good supply during the days of the saloons here.

Bert White, a transient, pleaded guilty to the charge of vagrancy, and received a sentence of thirty days at hard labor in the county jail. White was arrested as a suspected pickpocket. Hank Satten, a cripple, when arraigned this morning pleaded not guilty to the charge of vagrancy, but admitted that he has been staying in East Grand Forks for several weeks, and that he had been sleeping on the floor in a local pool room for some time. He was sentenced to thirty days at hard labor in the county jail.

Accused of being a vagrant, Hans Patterson pleaded not guilty to the charge when arraigned this morning. According to the evidence introduced, Patterson had made this city his home for over a month, and has also been a pool room sleeper. He is suspected of being a local laborer. He also received a sentence of thirty days at hard labor in the county jail. The rest of the prisoners were given suspended sentences on condition that they leave the city.
