TWO WESTERN MEN ON ALL-AMERICAN

Boston, of Minnesota, and Macomber, of Illinois, Are Named.

NOT A YALE MAN ON FIRST TEAM

Harvard Has Three Players Appointed—Three Elevens Chosen.

Only two western men were appointed by Walter Camp for positions on his mythical All-American team. Boston of Minnesota, generally conceded one of the greatest wing players in the country, was given an end position, and Macomber of Illinois, a heavy line-smashing man, was awarded a halfback berth.

Harvard has three men on the team—Gilman, tackle; King, halfback, and Mahan, fullback. Cornell has two positions, Shelton, end, and Barrett, quarter.

Not a Yale man is given a position on the first eleven, Black, one of the Eli's strongest linemen, is given guard on the second team. He is the only Yale man that appears, even considering Camp's third choice.

TRYING TO SMOKE OUT FRANK GOTCH

This is Opinion of Critics in Regard to Stecker Contest.

New York, Dec. 13.—Close followers of professional sport are of the opinion that a carefully planned campaign is under way to smoke out Frank Gotch, the retired wrestling champion. Joe Stecker of Dodge, Neb., the sensational young grappler, is apparently the candidate the promoters have in mind as opponent for the originator of the famous toe hold.

The preliminary work has all the earmarks of the campaign which preceded the matching of Jim Jeffries and Jack Johnson. It is possible, however, that if these two wrestlers meet on the mat that the bout will develop better wrestling than the Johnson-Jeffries bout did fighting.

Stecker is about 23 years of age and has shown remarkable strength and grappling ability in his short mat career. Rival wrestlers, who are never keen to praise an opponent, declare that he is a marvel. Gotch, while considerably older, is far from being a weakling. Since wrestlers do not deteriorate in either strength or grappling skill as rapidly as pugilists, it may be that Gotch will listen in due time to the promoters' proposals, although to date he has been deaf to the importunities of a host of foreign Goliaths.

CONFERENCE TO FIX STANDING

Will Make Clearer Definition of "Amateur" in National Sports.

New York, Dec. 13.—Sport governing bodies in almost every branch of amateur athletics in this country have applied favorably to the suggestion of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America, that a national conference be held to establish a clearer conception of amateurism.

As a result the conference set for December 27 promises to be a remarkable meeting in many respects and to have a decided influence on the future of amateur sport in the United States. According to the present plans there will be an advance meeting to be held in New York on December 19 at which time a tentative program will be arranged for the conference.

In a general way it is proposed to select officers at the main gathering and to appoint committees to represent all departments of sport, with instructions to report, later in the week, suggestions for improving the amateur standards in their particular branches.

These reports will be discussed and adopted in some form and then referred to the organization governing that particular sport for inclusion if so desired in its code of regulations. It is quite possible that this conference will be made an annual event.

MAY BE ABLE TO CURL TOMORROW

Cold Weather Brings Joy to Hearts of Local Devotees of the Game.

Germany Finds Substitute For Rubber For Automobiles.

Berlin, Dec. 13.—Automobile tires of artificial rubber are now being made in Germany, the Overseas News agency says. In his address to the Reichstag last week, Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg said German inventors had discovered a method of producing synthetic rubber.

"The Frankfurter Zeitung now announces that at almost the same hour that the chancellor's statement was made," the new agency says, "a factory succeeded in working this rubber into tires which will wear for a year."

MANY KILLED IN BIG EXPLOSION

Exact Cause of Explosion of Munitions Factory is Not Known.

Paris, Dec. 13.—One hundred and ten persons are reported to have been killed in Saturday's explosion in the Belgian munitions factory at Havre, says a dispatch from that city to the Temps yesterday.

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
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
