MAY PUT CHARGE OF COURT CONTEMPT

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 10.—Winnipeg officials may be compelled to cite Harry Whittia, a prominent local attorney, for contempt if he maintains his refusal to give evidence against Dr. H. M. Simpson, under arrest in England charged with complicity in the million-dollar parliament building fraud in this province.

Brought before a commission to give such a testimony, the deposition in question being proposed for the use of Commissioner of Police J. H. McRae, who goes to London shortly to take charge of Dr. Simpson and return him to Winnipeg. Whittia refused to answer the questions put to him, and he has retained an attorney to fight for his rights.

Whittia maintains that under the dominion's fugitive from justice act, the state cannot compel him to attend a court and give evidence in the absence of the accused.

LIKE CANADIAN PAY

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 10.—Russians, enlisting with the Canadian expeditionary force for service in Europe, prefer to go as Canadian soldiers only one cent a day, while Canada pays her soldiers \$1.10 a day.

Hence, the Russians, with an eye to business, find service with the Canadians decidedly more profitable. Recently the czar gave permission to Russians to enlist with the Canadians. Italians also want to enlist with Canada's forces, and their consuls in this country are seeking to obtain the consent of the King of Italy.

GORMAN BUYS WEEKLY RECORD

Former City Clerk Makes Newspaper Investment—Will be Editor.

James Gorman, former city clerk of East Grand Forks, today purchased the Weekly Record from Carl S. Iverson, who for the past five years has been owner and publisher of the paper. Mr. Gorman took possession this morning.

The Record was formerly known as the Valley View, which was established in 1900. In 1911, Carl Iverson and O. T. Rishoff purchased the journal and established it as the Weekly Record. Last fall Mr. Rishoff sold out his interest to Iverson, who has managed the concern since that time.

Mr. Gorman has made East Grand Forks his home for the past eight years and is well known throughout the state. Mr. Iverson will be employed as the manager of the job department by the new owner. The Record will be published every Friday as formerly, and Mr. Gorman will edit the paper.

TRACY MUST FACE CHARGE IN COURT

Polk County Grand Jury Returns true Bill Against Him for Causing Hall's Death.

Leo Tracy must face the charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of M. F. Hall of Austin, Minn., which occurred in East Grand Forks some time ago.

The Polk county grand jury late Saturday afternoon returned an indictment against Tracy, who is now being held in the county jail at Crookston.

Hall died from a fractured skull, caused, it is charged, by falling to the stone floor of a local saloon after being hit by Tracy.

BIG INCREASE IN BANK DEPOSITS

The annual report of the two East Grand Forks banks, announced Saturday, show a decided increase for the year 1915, as compared with 1914. The annual statement of the First National bank of this city shows the total resources to amount to \$511,298.17, an increase of \$72,798.26 over last year. The deposits show an increase of \$71,926.26 over 1914 and makes a total of \$410,505.17.

TWO KILLED AND SIX INJURED BY WILD CAR Machine Dashes Through Crowd of Young People—One Man Confesses to Be Driver of Auto. Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 10.—Two persons were killed and six injured early yesterday when an automobile tore through a party of young people returning home from an entertainment, and sped on without stopping. Sarah Shub, 19 years old, and Maurice Driscoll, 23, were dead when picked up. Rescuers found six other persons stretched on the snow two of them Ethel Lindman, 17, and Liba Lindman, 19, sustained injuries which physicians said would cause death and custody, one of whom, Ralph Smiley, an automobile mechanic, 24 years old, admitted in an affidavit, according to the prosecuting attorney, that he was driving the car which caused the accident.

GERMANY CONFESSES CRIME, SAYS PAPER Pleads Guilty to American Note—Memory and Confession Itself Will Be Recorded in History. Rome, Jan. 10.—Germany pleads guilty, says The Giornale d'Italia, commenting on Germany's latest replies to the American note. The newspaper adds that Germany, by promising to give orders to insure safety of passengers before ships sunk, implicitly admitted that this was not done in the past, and she thus confessed a crime, the memory of which and of the confession itself, will be recorded in history.
