Several western congressmen object to pending water power legislation on the ground that it will tend to discourage utilization of the power which in many of the western states have in vast quantities in an undeveloped state.

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MONTENEGRO IS SECOND SERBIA

Steam Roller of war Passing Over Country—Violent Onslaught Progressing.

London, Jan. 12.—Montenegro is being treated to a steam roller attack similar to that which crumbled its friend and neighbor Serbia.

The great Montenegrin stronghold, Mount Lovcen, has fallen, according to the Austrian official communication. The attack here has been largely assisted by Austro-Serbian troops and the guns of the Cattaro forts.

British Public Uneasy. For the British public the latest statements regarding the situation in Mesopotamia will not entirely relieve the anxiety which has been set in the relief of Kut-el-Amara.

No Fresh Developments. There have been no fresh developments on the Russian front, where the cold weather and the thermometer at some points touching 20 degrees below zero.

As far as the western front is concerned, the center of interest is still the Champagne region. According to French accounts, there was clearly no serious fighting, although the big German attack, which the French claimed they successfully stopped.

At Raid on Saloniki. London, Jan. 12.—A dispatch to Reuter's Telegram company from Sofia says: "A squadron of 12 German aeroplanes on Friday dropped 45 bombs on Saloniki, devoting special attention to the camps of the French and English, among which twenty hits were scored, causing an outbreak of fire."

Bulgars Attack Greeks. Paris, Jan. 12.—News received from trustworthy sources is to the effect that soldiers of the 27th Bulgarian regiment attacked the Greek troops at the village of Westra, and tried to occupy two frontier posts.

Government Forces in Hupen and Nankin Revolt—Ammunition Supplied—One City is Taken.

San Francisco, Jan. 12.—Chinese government troops in the province of Hupen and Nankin, former capital of the province of Kiangsu, have joined the revolutionists in Fukien and Hunan provinces and have proclaimed their independence.

Arms and ammunition, the cable said, were supplied the revolutionists by the government troops. With their aid the revolutionists occupied the city of Sam-Shui in Kwangtung, and General Leung Tin Kwang, commanding the province, to surrender or leave Canton, his headquarters.

(By the Minneapolis Journal's Washington correspondent.) Washington, Jan. 12. President Woodrow Wilson today threw his challenge back to William Jennings Bryan on the one-term plank in the democratic national platform, which Mr. Bryan offered and which the convention adopted.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Speakers for the Women's Peace party, headed by Miss Jane Addams of Chicago, pleaded with the senate and house committees on foreign relations yesterday to enlist the strength of the United States to help end the European war.
