CITY PHYSICIAN IS GIVEN RAISE
Dr. Kirk Would Not Accept Job for \$30 a Month—Raised Salary \$5.
At the second meeting of the East Grand Forks city council under the Kelleher administration, held at the city hall last evening, the matter of raising the salary of the city physician, Dr. G. P. Kirk, who would not agree to take the position at the salary offered by the council, as his duties are much greater at this time than formerly. It was decided to raise his salary from \$30 to \$35 a month.
The matter of supporting the city band by an appropriation of the city funds and paying a salary to the leader, was hotly discussed last evening. It was finally decided to drop the matter for the present.
Andrew Peterson was denied the right to erect a frame building, reinforced with sheet iron, to use as a warehouse, on the grounds that it was within the fire line and therefore contrary to the city ordinance.
According to a decision reached by the council last evening, the city funds will be deposited with the First National and First State banks of this city. Security bonds were set at \$15,000 each.
The matter of reducing the salaries of the members of the water and light commission was discussed last evening but it was found that the city council could not take action at this time in the matter, and that the reduction can only be made through the voluntary action of the board itself. Efforts will be made through the council to induce the commission to accept a cut in salary.
Other routine business was disposed of, and a motion passed to advertise for bids for the legal printing. Bonds of the various city officials were accepted by the council.
