

# FATHER LIVES NEAR SCENE OF AWFUL OUTRAGE

## Grand Forks Woman Anxious as to Safety of Her Parent in Mexico.

### MRS. J. G. HANEY KNEW TWO VICTIMS

#### Acquainted With Men Shot Down in Terrible Affair Yesterday.

Mrs. J. G. Haney, 1420 University avenue, this city, a former resident of Guerrero, in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, knew two of the men killed by Mexican bandits yesterday after being taken from a Mexico North-western train 50 miles northwest of Chihuahua, robbed and stripped of their clothing, and then shot.

Recent Letters Unanswered. Mrs. Haney's father, D. R. Cramer and three brothers and their families, were still living near Guerrero when last heard from on November 20. At that time Mr. Cramer had just returned from Chihuahua City to his ranch near the famous Baboora ranch, on the Phoebe Hurst property. Since then several letters from Mrs. Haney to her relatives in Mexico have failed to bring an answer. Whether some misfortune has befallen them, or the letters have been intercepted by bandits, can only be surmised.

Pringle One Time Football Star. Charles A. Pringle of San Francisco, and Maurice Anderson, a clerk in his father's brokerage office in Chihuahua City, were well known to both Mr. and Mrs. Haney. Mr. Pringle has lived in San Francisco all his life, according to Mrs. Haney, and was formerly a noted football star at the University of California. He was interested in mining property in Mexico, and was on his way to take charge of a mine for the American Smelting and Refining company at Chihuahua, Chihuahua, of which he had been appointed superintendent. Maurice Anderson, the other friend of the Haney family, is also numbered among the victims of the awful outrage. Mr. Anderson, with a father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Anderson, moved to Chihuahua City

about 33 years ago from New York state, and opened a brokerage office at that place. It was on a hunting trip to Chihuahua state in Mexico from the United States, that Mr. Haney first met Miss Cramer, now Mrs. Haney. About fifteen years ago they were married, and have lived in the United States since that time. For several years they have made Grand Forks their home, where Mr. Haney is superintendent of the International Harvester company's experimental farm near the university. Mr. Haney has made several trips west through Colorado and Arizona on lecture tours in the interests of agriculture, but has not been able to visit his father-in-law since leaving Mexico.

Bandit Chief a Terror. General Tustualorico, the Mexican rebel in Carranza's army, who was killed several months ago by American troops on the border between the United States and Mexico, was a native of Guerrero, Mrs. Haney's former home, and had come from that place just shortly before being shot by American troops. While in Guerrero, he had created a miniature reign of terror among the law-abiding American residents. Every effort is being made to locate Mrs. Haney's relatives in Mexico, but so far the attempt has proved futile.

## SPECIAL ASSESSMENT COMMISSION AT WORK

### Assessing Four Sewer Jobs and One Watermain Extension—To Complete Work This Week.

The special assessment commission, composed of W. W. Fagan, S. S. Caswell and J. D. Johnson, is at work this week assessing four sewer jobs and one watermain extension. The commission will complete its work this week.

The sewers being assessed are: Lateral No. 16, sewer district No. 5, in alley between Budge and Dike avenues, from Eschelman to Parkhurst, which cost \$1,676.61; lateral No. 17, sewer district No. 5, on Sixth street from Griggs to 12th river avenue, which cost \$640.17; lateral No. 18, sewer district No. 5, in alley between Dakota and Cheyenne avenues, from Eschelman to Walsh streets, which cost \$1,375.78; and lateral No. 16, in sewer district No. 4, in alley between Cottonwood and Cheyenne, from Ninth to Tenth avenues, which cost \$629.32. The watermain extension is No. 77 on Viets' avenue from Lewis Boulevard to Conklin avenue, costing \$994.92.

# STUDY CITY'S ADVANTAGES AS SITE FOR PLANT

## Committee of Society of Equity Looking Over Local Conditions.

### PROPOSE TO BUILD PACKING PLANT

#### Matter is Backed Generally by Farmers of North Dakota.

With a view to determining this city's advantages as a site for the proposed packing plant, which the North Dakota union of the American Society of Equity contemplates building at some point in the state, the equity's committee, consisting of C. J. Lee of Valley City, P. M. Casey of Lisbon and Anthony Walton of Minot, is in Grand Forks today.

This morning the visiting committee conferred with the representatives of the Grand Forks Commercial club, and they will hold a further conference with them this evening. Tomorrow they will look over the site that has been proposed for the plant.

The equity organization is greatly interested in the plan of building a packing plant. It would maintain such plant on a thoroughly co-operative basis, with the profits being distributed both to the buyers and the consumers.

It is proposed to organize a corporation with a \$500,000 capital stock, and it will be made a co-operative affair throughout. Investors for working men, etc., all would be built on the basis of co-operation.

The committee that is in Grand Forks today is greatly pleased at the prospects.

Grand Forks, Fargo, New Rockford, Devils Lake, Minot, Williston, Bismarck, Valley City, Jamestown and Wahpeton are cities being considered for the proposed plant.

Mr. Rindge who has been spending the past few years visiting colleges and universities throughout the United States, studying into the industrial conditions of the communities, showing to college men their opportunities, and linking men up in one way or another to a constructive program. He is a very interesting speaker, full of interesting experiences with which he came in touch among industrial men. 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# COLD AND SNOW CAUSES DELAY

## All Trains Coming into Grand Forks Considerably Delayed—No Relief.

Train service on both the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific has been greatly retarded during the past two days by the severe cold wave and snow storms throughout the northwest.

On the Great Northern, No. 3, coming from the east, was over seven hours late into Grand Forks. It is due in Grand Forks at 7:45 a. m., but on account of the extreme cold and high wind was delayed in Minnesota, and arrived in the city about 3 o'clock.

Number 29, out of St. Paul, was over two hours late, No. 4, from the west, was delayed in passing through the Rocky mountains, and arrived in Grand Forks over four hours late.

The Winnipeg train, on the Northern Pacific, due in Grand Forks shortly after 1 p. m., was over two hours late. Heavy snows, cold and wind between Winnipeg and the border line of the United States, was the cause of the delay. Snow plows were necessary to clear the track before the train could be gotten through to Pembina.

Freight service is being kept to a minimum in order to keep the mail and passenger service on schedule.

According to weather forecasts received from headquarters at St. Paul by local officials, the cold wave will continue for several days all over the northwest.

Industrial Service Will Be Discussed

### Eastern Investigator to Address University Gatherings Monday and Tuesday.

A splendid opportunity to hear the industrial movement discussed will be given to university men next Monday and Tuesday. Fred Rindge, member of the International committee of the Y. M. C. A. will visit the local organization at the university. He is now acting as one of the secretaries of the industrial service movement, launched a few years ago in one of the eastern schools.

At present there are some 3,500 college men from 160 colleges, rendering volunteer industrial service under the auspices of the Christian associations.

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
