ACCUSES HUSBAND OF BOASTING LOVE CONQUESTS: FREED

San Francisco, Jan. 17.—The truth of the old adage, "Absence makes the heart grow fonder," was somewhat shaken in this city, when Mrs. Elsa Cook Greenfield Tracy appeared before Superior Judge George Cabanis, and in less than fifteen minutes won an interlocutory decree of divorce from her husband, Captain James Kenneth Tracy, U. S. M. C., now attached with the Pacific fleet in Mexico waters.

Too much boasting of many conquests of other women on the part of Captain Tracy, all of which caused the plaintiff great mental anguish, was alleged by the wife in her complaint as grounds for the action.

Though represented by counsel, Captain Tracy did not contest the suit, and after a short hearing from the wife, Judge Cabanis ordered the divorce. The property settlement was arranged out of court.

It was only a few short months ago, June 24, 1915, to be exact, that the pretty and popular Elsa Greenfield was said to have refused the hand of Charles Kenyon, playwright and author, in favor of the suit of Captain Tracy, then stationed at Expedition marine barracks.

Their marriage was one of the gay events of the season, but, according to the wife's account, the gayety soon vanished and the monotony of the captain's continuous stories of his own prowess and his list of feminine hearts proved unbearable.

They parted, she says, almost before the honeymoon was ended, and the determination to request a divorce followed the departure of Captain Tracy on the cruiser San Diego.

Mrs. Tracy is the daughter of "Bob" Cook, who won fame at Yale as a member of New Haven's eighth. Her marriage to "Buddy" Greenfield, musician, was one of the romances associated with the fire of 1908.
