BRAIN STROKE PROVES FATAL

Mrs. Jennie Rogers Survives Only 10 Days, Death Coming Sunday Evening.

Mrs. Jennie Rogers, aged 55, stricken with a hemorrhage of the brain ten days ago at the home of her brother, Otto Keller, 415 North Sixth street, died at 6 o'clock Sunday evening of a second stroke, beginning Friday, resulting fatally.
While Mrs. Rogers rallied slightly from the first attack, there was at no time very great hopes for her recovery, the rally being but temporary.
Funeral services will be held at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning from St. Michael's pro-cathedral, with Monsignor Lemieux officiating.
Mrs. Rogers was a resident of Grand Forks back in 1879, coming here with her sister, who later was wed to W. J. Deboer, now of Rugby. She died a number of years ago.
In 1880, Miss Keller was married to H. H. Cline, and resided here several years, later removing west. Mr. Cline was a stage driver during the pioneer days of this region. He died a number of years ago. For 13 years after her marriage Mrs. Rogers made her home in Winnipeg.
Mrs. Rogers came to Grand Forks last spring during the illness of her mother, Mrs. Louise Keller, and after her death, kept house for her brothers, Otto and John Keller. They, and Charles Keller of East Grand Forks are the only survivors.
