DR. J. D. TAYLOR ATTENDS STATE BOARD MEETING

Important Session of Regents Opens at Bismarck This Afternoon.

CONTRACT MATTERS TO BE CONSIDERED

Plan is to Make Part for all Institutions at Same Time.

Dr. J. D. Taylor left last night for Bismarck, where he is attending a meeting of the State Board of Regents, which opened there this afternoon.

The questions of arranging for contracts for the publication of the catalogues, for the janitor and dormitory supplies, for uniform regulations regarding the government of the various educational institutions, annual budgets, entertainment and lecture course and kindred subjects are to be considered in a preliminary way at this meeting.

The meeting will continue for the remainder of the week and Dr. Taylor will not return until Sunday or Monday.

One of the most important matters to come up is that of making arrangements for letting contracts.

Contract Matters. The board believes that a better quality of goods can be obtained at possibly reduced rates through letting the contracts in this manner than by permitting each institution to award its own.

The call for bids will be so arranged that local dealers can get after the contracts in their home towns, or after those in all the institutions if they desire.

GRAND FORKS MAN'S BROTHER WOUNDED

Three Times Shot in Western Theater of War, Hugh Kennedy is "Game" and Returns to the Front.

Wounded three times during as many different battles, Hugh Kennedy of Sudbury, Ontario, brother of M. C. Kennedy, 208 North Fourth street, Grand Forks, is again back in the front of the line, fighting with the Canadian soldiers against the Germans in France.

M. C. Kennedy declared last night that he had received only four letters from his brother since he went to the front, the last message coming six weeks ago, at which time he was again a wounded patient in one of the French war hospitals.

Since then, however, he has left the hospital and returned to the zone of fighting, according to later letters received by relatives at Sudbury.

In one of his battles he received a bullet through the muscles of the upper portion of his arm; in another a shot pierced his side, and in a third engagement a messenger of death entered the leg just above the knee.

"They can't give him enough and it looks as though they can't kill him," remarked his brother last night.

LOCAL MEN TO CREDIT MEETING

Large Delegation of Wholesalers Attending Sessions in Fargo.

Between 40 and 50 wholesale credit men of the northwest convened this afternoon at the Masonic temple in Fargo for a conference to take up the discussion of discount and interest, uniform legislation, credit exchange and an adjustment bureau.

The Grand Forks association of the Wholesale Credit Men was well represented at the meeting, among the local men present being W. G. McDonald of Nash Bros., C. O. Hagen of the Grand Forks Mercantile company, J. R. Carley of the First National bank, Louis Rohde of the Congress Candy company, M. C. Bacheller of the Northwestern credit bureau and John Vallely, local representative of the Northwestern Credit Bureau of St. Paul. P. J. Kavanaugh, president of the Grand Forks association, was unable to attend.

The first speakers on the program were A. B. Cross, Duluth; J. F. Jordan, Minneapolis; and A. M. Eckstrand, who took up the first question.

Among the towns represented at the meeting are Crookston, Grand Forks, Fargo, Minot, Bismarck, Williston, Devils Lake, Jarriston and Valley City, Duluth and other cities.

A dinner and smoker will be held this evening, after which committee reports will be presented and considered.

Thrift Campaign in Grand Forks Is Plan of Local Branch of the American Institute of Banking

The Grand Forks chapter of the American Institute of Banking is planning to carry out the "Thrift Year" campaign as outlined by the institute. The work in this city will be carried on in conjunction with the banks of Grand Forks, the board of education and the Commercial club.

The plan is to conduct a quiet "thrift campaign" in the city, with the object of reaching as many people as possible and illustrating to them the necessity and value of thrift in a national as well as an individual sense.

The American Institute of Banking planned the campaign in commemoration of the centennial of the founding of the first savings bank in the United States. Its purpose is to conduct a nation-wide thrift campaign and by various educational methods show the people of this country the value and necessity of thrift in a national sense.

The United States long has been known as the most thrifty and extravagant nation and suddenly has become the banking nation of the world. When the war is ended, the European countries will depend upon the United States to finance the reconstruction work, and the financial agencies of this country will be subjected to a long strain. Thrift, nationally and individually, is needed, the American institute declares, and thus the campaign to teach the people the importance of saving.

Plans for the Grand Forks campaign will be formulated at a meeting to be held in a short time.

MISUSE OF MAILS IS CHARGE MADE

Dayton, Ohio, Feb. 17.—United States District Attorney Stuart Bolla yesterday caused the arrest of Charles Silk and George L. Ames, both said to be from Chicago, charging misuse of the mails in connection with piano contests. Arrests on similar charges in Columbus, Cincinnati and other Ohio cities are said to be pending.

They were arraigned before United States Commissioner Howell and in default of \$5,000 bonds were remanded to the county jail. Government inspectors are making a check on all cases to be processed until February 21.

HIS MAIDEN SPEECH

Washington, Feb. 17.—Senator Husting of Wisconsin made his first speech in the senate yesterday, opposing the Shields bill to provide for development of water power in navigable streams by private capital. He urged amending the bill so that the federal government might receive compensation for concessionaires and regulate the method of operation. An amendment by Senator Walsh providing for federal compensation was defeated 15 to 35.
