Superior, Wis., Feb. 18.—At a conference held at the Commercial club yesterday it was decided to place a Superior Northern league team in the league notwithstanding the fact that Charley Moll has tied up with Winnipeg and cannot come here providing those who subscribed money for the support of a team headed by the Milwaukee man are willing to support another proposition.

As those business men who pledged \$100 each toward the organization of a league team did so mainly to provide baseball for the city there is little doubt that they will be willing to join with those who favor baseball with or without Moll.

Mr. Moll was present at the conference and explained to the business men that he had been offered a much better proposition at Winnipeg and could not very well turn it down to accept the local offer, which would probably mean less to him financially.
