

WAR ON WILSON TO BE DECLARED

To Come as Result of Refusal to Disclose Facts Asked For.

Washington, Feb. 18.—War on the Wilson administration is to be declared by students of the Mexican situation in the United States senate, such as Senators Albert B. Fall of New Mexico and William E. Borah of Idaho. These men say they have been holding off because they did not desire to embarrass the president, but that now, with the president declining to disclose anything about Mexican policy, they say they propose to make public what they know about the failure of the United States government to compel respect on the part of Mexicans for the lives of Americans. The substitution by the administration of a document arguing the complete success of its Mexican policy and the suppression of the facts asked for by the senate, is declared to be the last straw. The senators assert that Americans have been killed because they were Americans, and that it ought to have brought action on the part of the American government. Since Wilson has been president, they claim, 93 Americans have been butchered in Mexico.

INVESTIGATING PASS GRANTING

Dallas, Tex., Feb. 18.—Investigation of the alleged granting of annual passes to shippers through their appointment as railroad directors, was concluded here. R. E. Eddy, special examiner for the interstate commerce commission, will resume the hearing Monday in Amarillo. During the inquiry here a mass of testimony has been introduced in the effort to show that Texas railroads generally have made a practice of appointing directors who were large shippers and who received free passes through their official connection with the railroads.

Supreme Court Decision

From Barnes County. M. O. Grangard, plaintiff and respondent, vs. John Betzina, defendant and appellant. Syllabus: (1) A broker employed to sell land for a specific price and who has agreed with his principal that he shall receive a dollar an acre commission provided that he sells at such price, does not perform his obligation so as to be entitled to recover such commission in a suit upon such contract by producing a purchaser who is not willing to pay the price named and even though the price thereafter falls to a lower price, and where there is no agreement that the owner did not act in good faith or that he prevented the broker from performing his contract. Appeal from the district court of Barnes county, Coffey, J. Action for cover commission on a sale of real estate. Judgment for plaintiff. Defendant appeals. Reversed. Opinion of the court by Bruce, J.

From Stark County. The County of Stark in the state of North Dakota, a municipal corporation, plaintiff and respondent, vs. Adam F. Mischel, et al., defendants and appellants. Syllabus: Action by Stark county to recover \$4,794 of county commissioner's and former state's Attorney Murchison and bondsmen of said officials, for paying that amount to said state's attorney who received it for obtaining and collecting a judgment for \$9,589 against a former defaulting county auditor and his surety. Held: The complaint states a cause of action against the former officials as principals and against their sureties. (2) Principals and sureties may be joined in one action as the liability of each and all spring from the joint act of the principals, and against whose wrongful diversion of public money the sureties have contracted to indemnify. (3) The liability of all arose from the one transaction, alleged misappropriation of public funds. (4) Causes of action ex contractu and ex delicto may be joined under such circumstances. (5) A demurrer to a complaint does not reach a failure to separately state causes of action.

From an order of the district court of Stark county, Crawford, J., overruling demurrer, defendants appeal. Affirmed. Opinion of the court by Goss, J. Bruce, J. dissenting.
