Jamestown, N. D., Feb. 22.—Tom Sinnott received severe injuries when he was thrown from a load of lumber and a severe scalp wound sustained. He was crossing the railroad tracks with a load of lumber when one sled runner came off, throwing him violently to the ground. The top of his head was injured. He left on the evening train for Brainerd where he will recuperate.



VELNO IS ASSURED OF NEW POSTOFFICE

Sheldon, N. D., Feb. 22.—A postoffice at Venlo is now assured, notices having been received and posted in the Sheldon postoffice to the effect that applications for postmaster at that point will be received up until February 23. An office was established there early last spring but the failure to get some person to act as postmaster caused the government to abandon the matter. About a month ago R. E. Kratt, who has business interests at Venlo, took the matter up with Congressman Heigerson, who laid them before the postoffice officials and immediate action was taken where the matter was dropped last spring. A store has been opened at Venlo since the failure to get postoffice opened last spring, and Harris Rubel who is conducting the business will be an applicant for the postmastership.
