

POLITICS ARE RED HOT ISSUE IN CITY TODAY

Campaign Will be Brought to Close with Rousing Dinnie Meeting Tonight

VOTERS ELECT MAYOR TUESDAY

Warm Interest Displayed in the Forks Centers Around That Office.

The republicans and democratic primaries will also be conducted throughout North Dakota tomorrow when voters of both parties in the state will elect delegates to the national conventions, nominate presidential electors and a presidential nominee.

Dinnie Meeting Tonight. The Dinnie campaign will be brought to a grand climax this evening when a meeting is to be held in the city hall starting at 7:45 o'clock. Mayor James A. Dinnie, candidate for re-election, and several aldermen will be the speakers, and some of the warmest ammunition of the campaign will be fired at that time, it is expected. A cordial invitation is extended to the public to attend.

The majority contest between James A. Dinnie, the present incumbent, and A. G. Sorlie, his opponent, has aroused the greatest interest of the campaign.

Two years ago Mr. Sorlie opposed Mr. Dinnie and was defeated by a large majority. The outcome of the contest is looked forward to with the keenest interest.

Other contests of more than ordinary interest are those of R. J. Purcell, present city justice and candidate for re-election, opposed by County Justice P. McLoughlin, and Jacob Welch, candidate for re-election as city treasurer, opposed by Thomas Gray, former police sergeant.

There is also considerable interest being taken in the contest for membership of the park board between Max Rabinovich and E. S. Kneeland. Mr. Rabinovich is the present commissioner.

In two of the wards of the city there are aldermanic contests. In the Second ward Peter Standal is seeking the seat of E. I. Pyles, the present alderman.

There are three candidates in the Third ward, Thomas Griffiths, the present alderman, being opposed by A. G. Lockman and August Schave. In other wards of the city there are no contests.

The polls designated by the city council in the various precincts, will be open from 8 o'clock a. m., to 5 o'clock p. m.

FLOOD WATERS ROUT DEER OUT ONTO PRAIRIES

Eleven Fine Animals, Scared by Train, Captured on River Ice.

GAME PARADISE IS DISCLOSED

Casper Olson Brings Back Interesting Story From Williston.

As the result of the extremely high water in the Missouri and Little Muddy rivers in the western part of the state, the deer are being driven from the timbered lowlands to the prairies, according to Casper Olson of Grand Forks, manager of the Avery motor truck branch here, who returned from Williston last evening.

Mr. Olson also tells of the interesting capture of 11 deer who were marooned on the ice of the river, two miles west of the city of Williston. Frightened from the railroad trucks by a passing Great Northern train on the main line, a band of 13 deer scampered out onto the ice of the Missouri last Tuesday night. The deer were unable to "navigate" on the slippery ice and lay down in the middle of the stream.

It was two days before 11 of the animals were captured by rescuers, two of the 13 deer making their escape. Some of the deer were badly frozen; two of them number died and another is now dying. The rest of the animals are the specimens and are in splendid condition, however. The captured deer have been placed in a pen at Williston.

River Rises High. The water has risen at the point where the deer ran out onto the ice to within two feet of the railroad tracks and the river is going still higher, according to Mr. Olson.

Despite the fact that the water is extremely high and that the ice has just commenced to move out, comparatively little snow has melted and a more serious situation is threatened later in the spring.

The driving of the deer from the lowlands has brought to light the fact that North Dakota is a veritable game paradise and the home of numerous fine specimens of such animals. The closed season on deer will be in effect until 1920, and present indications are that after that time North Dakota sportsmen will enjoy some splendid shooting. While the rising waters have driven the deer from the lowlands, it is not believed that the animals are undergoing much hardship on account of that condition.

Minot to Get Deer. It is understood that four of the captured deer at Williston will be sent to Minot, together with three elk from Yellowstone national park, to be placed in a park at that city. Chief Game Warden E. B. McCutcheon of Minot and Assistant John Patterson of Stanley aided in the capture of the deer.

Mr. Olson visited over a considerable portion of Montana during his trip. He reports that in the country around Havre the snow has entirely gone, but that from a point beginning about 50 miles east of the Montana city there is still a large quantity of "the beautiful" upon the ground.

JOHNSON SAYS WATER STORY IS NOT TRUE

Makes Affidavit That Main Was Only Turned on Once.

IS PUMP REPAIRER OF GREAT NORTHERN

Flatly Denies the Assertions Made by Sorlie Campaign Committee.

John Johnson, pump repairer of the Great Northern Railway company, nails another campaign lie to the cross, makes affidavit that the story circulated by the Sorlie campaign committee relative to furnishing water to the Great Northern Railway company free of charge is false and untrue, and corroborates the statements made by H. Juncan, chief engineer of the water and light plant, Peter Le Meter, overseer of mains and meters, and Ed. Ruskfeldt, meter reader.

STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA,
 County of Grand Forks, ss.
 J. Johnson, being first duly sworn on oath, deposes and says: That he is a resident of the City of Grand Forks and has resided in said city for the past twenty years; that he is in the employ of the Great Northern Railway company as a pump repairer and has worked for said company since 1882; that affiant has charge of the watermains in the Great Northern Railway yards in the City of Grand Forks and knows from his own personal knowledge that the valve on the Fourth avenue main was not turned on to furnish water to the Great Northern Railway Co. since the 15th day of October, 1915, with the exception of six hours on the 21st day of January, 1916, when affiant requested Peter Le Meter, overseer of watermains and water meters to shut off the raw water supply so that a leak in our main near the depot could be repaired, and that during the time it required to repair such leak, being a period of about six hours, water was furnished through the Fourth avenue main; that neither affiant nor any other person in the employ of the Great Northern Railway company have ever turned the valves in the mains which furnish water to the Great Northern Railway company.

Further affiant saith not save that this affidavit is made for the purpose of showing that the only time that the Great Northern Railway company was supplied with water from the Fourth avenue main since Oct. 9, 1915, was during the period of six hours on the 21st day of January, 1916, and that any statement made to the contrary is false and untrue.

LIVING COST TO BE LOWER

Fresh Eggs are Very Scarce at This Season—Butter is Firm.

Supplies of all edibles are good on the Grand Forks produce market and the amount of fruits and vegetables are improving daily. Prices in this market are expected to take a slight drop as is usual at this season of the year.

Local dealers aver that trade was never better for the spring season, being much heavier than a year ago.

The egg market continues to fluctuate greatly in Grand Forks. A few days ago, the warm weather forced the price down considerably, and large numbers were sold in the city. Storage eggs, however, have now been completely sold out, and additional supplies are being obtained with the consequent stiffening of the market.

Local dealers declare, however, that should temperatures over the country become more seasonal, egg prices would drop again, but not to any great extent in view of the active demand being met with.

Butter quotations are remaining fairly firm. Dealers declare that while the production of butter in this section of the country is increasing, the consumption is not keeping pace with it, and it is thought that the general range of the market this spring and summer will be higher than during the period last year.

Apples still hold the lead in the fruit market. Quotations received by local wholesalers state that barrel apples are regarded as exceptionally low for this season of the year.

The average quality of oranges in this section, is improving and with the better consumption, local dealers declare that a higher market will be the result. Grape fruit is also in great demand at this season of the year.
