

HEAVY VOTE BEING CAST HERE TODAY

Interest Centers on Contest For Mayorality of City.

LIGHT BALLOT THROUGH STATE

Democrats Having Warm Battle in the Primary Election.

A heavy vote is being cast today in Grand Forks in the city and primary elections. Indications this afternoon were that the number of votes cast would be well over the 2,000 mark. At the last city election there were 1,822 ballots cast.

Interest is centering on the contest for the mayorality between J. A. Dinne and A. G. Sorlie. Both sides claim to be confident of victory, and it is likely that when the votes are counted the race will be found to be close.

As a result of the city election a heavy vote is also being cast in the primaries for presidential nominees, electors, etc., and national committee men.

Extra Planned. The polls will close at 5 o'clock. The Herald will publish an extra giving the result of the mayorality election as soon as it is known.

Elsewhere in the state where city elections are not being held the vote is reported to be light. This applies to Fargo, Minot and others of the larger cities.

As far as the primary is concerned interest is mainly centered on the fight between the Bruegger and anti-Bruegger factions of the democratic party.

Reports from the Missouri Slope state that inclement weather conditions are cutting down the vote.

TWO SENTENCED IN NEW MEXICO COURT

Santa Fe, N. M., March 21.—J. O. Starr was sentenced to be hanged and C. Schmidt to life imprisonment by Judge E. L. Medler at Las Cruces today for the murder of Sheriff Dwight B. Stephens of Luna county on February 20 last. Franco Acosta was acquitted on the charge of participation in the killing.

The three men were charged with the murder of Sheriff Stephenson near Rincon, following their escape from the county jail at Deming.

Business Places of City Assume Aspect of Spring; "Shop Early" Is Wish of Grand Forks Dealers

Grand Forks business houses are beginning to assume a very marked aspect of spring, new spring styles are being donned by the "models" in show windows of ladies furnishing establishments and spring goods are being conspicuously displayed.

In view of the spring rush which is expected before the first of April, local merchants are unanimous in expressing the wish that shoppers do much of their buying in the forenoon, and avoid the rush and cram of the afternoons.

It makes it very hard for the clerks when the shoppers come with a rush in the afternoon, and, anyway, "the early bird gets the worm." Oftentimes much of the best of the stock is disposed of in the earlier part of the day," said A. Cohn, manager of Taughbols, today.

Belted Norfolk models and black and light check suits are the prevailing styles of ladies wear this spring, he declared.

Jewelry stores are also adding their new spring stocks at this time. According to A. E. Palmer, wrist watches are coming back into style stronger than ever this year, and local dealers are laying in extra large supplies in expectation of a large sale of this commodity.

Shoe stocks in local establishments are also being replenished with the new spring styles. Button shoes are the prevailing styles in this line, according to local dealers. Light gray styles for ladies are also coming into the limelight this spring. Buckles are being used largely on ladies shoes.

SLAIN MAN'S BODY EXAMINED

Investigation Exonerates Emil Sundman From Rolette County Crime

Sheriff Arthur Johnson of Rolla, Rolette county, was in the city today aiding in the investigation of the identity of the man who gave his name as Emil Sundman after he had been fatally shot near the village of Arvilla, this county, October 26, last.

Clue Starts Probe. The Rolette county official had received a clue which connected Sundman, who died shortly after the Arvilla shooting, with a crime perpetrated in Rolette county.

A wound in Sundman's stomach led the authorities to believe that he might have been a man who was shot during a robbery in Rolette county early last fall.

Sundman's body was being examined by experts at the state health laboratory of the university today in an effort to identify him.

Crawls Several Miles. Sundman crawled for several miles into Arvilla on the morning of October 26 with fatal revolver wounds in his body. He told a story of being held up and shot by robbers and shortly after died.

After a careful investigation it was announced late this afternoon that Sundman was not the man wanted in Rolette county and Sheriff Johnson left on his return trip to Rolla.

APPEAL SENT TO MANY NEWSPAPERS

Albuquerque, N. M., March 21.—An appeal to avoid publication of unofficial dispatches on the Mexican border situation was sent to New Mexico newspapers yesterday by Summers Burkhardt, United States district attorney.

The district attorney said the appeal was issued in response to telegraphic requests from General Funston and Major W. R. Sample, commandant at Columbus. The appeal says dispatches already sent out have embarrassed the military through giving Villa agents information they could not secure otherwise.

SUPPLY OF SARDINES NEARLY EXHAUSTED; NO MORE TO BE OBTAINED

"When the present supply of Norwegian sardines is exhausted, Grand Forks residents will have to forego the eating of this product of the Scandinavian fishermen," declared a local wholesale grocer today.

Friction between England and Norway is largely responsible, he said.

The largest part of the tin plate supply used in the manufacture of tins in which to ship the sardines is imported from Scotland. The shipment of large amounts of sardines and other canned goods to Germany from Norway caused the British to place an embargo on the supply of tin plate from Scotland.

The lack of sufficient bottoms in which to import the sardines from Norway is also another big factor in the loss of this product to the United States.

GOOD LAND IS EASY TO SELL

Local Business Men are Investing Money in Valley Lands.

"Almost anything in the way of a well located, moderate priced house or quarter section of land can be disposed of this spring," said a prominent local real estate dealer today.

One of the most noticeable conditions, according to W. H. Bird, a local realty operator, is the fact that a large number of Grand Forks business men are inquiring about land in territory about the city within a radius of about 30 miles.

This is a most unusual condition, he declared, but local business men have already invested large amounts in Red river valley lands.

"They are waking up to the fact that North Dakota real estate is an extraordinarily fine investment," he declared.

A large number of inquiries from outside the state have also been received by local dealers, asking about land in this section of the state. An exceptionally large number of farmers from the central states are expected to migrate to North Dakota this year.

As attesting that Grand Forks' population is rapidly growing, local real estate men comment of the fact that a large number of inquiries are being received from persons contemplating taking up their homes here within the next couple of months.

A large number of renters in Grand Forks are also contemplating buying homes in the city this season, said Mr. Bird.

"Conditions in the real estate business never looked so good," he declared today.

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
