

RESOLUTION EMPOWERS PRESIDENT TO ISSUE CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS

LIES ON TABLE TILL THURSDAY; HOUSE DEBATE

Federalization of National Guard is the Question Discussed.

Washington, March 22.—Senator Lawrence Y. Sherman, of Illinois, republican, introduced the resolution to authorize and direct the president immediately to call for 50,000 volunteers for service in Mexico.

Under the rules, the resolution lies on the table until tomorrow.

House Debate. The debate in the house on the army bill immediately developed opposition to the proposal to put the national guard under federal control.

Representative Fletcher, of Kentucky, asserted that the court decisions showed the guard could not be federalized without a constitutional amendment. Representative Wilson, republican, of Connecticut, a member of the committee, offered an amendment specifying oaths of enlistment for officers, men of national guard, and providing obligation to both federal and state governments, and the federal right to their service to precede that of the state.

DUTCH GOVERNMENT AGAIN IN MARKET

Firms that have been fortunate in getting a boat for a definite date have succeeded in shipping grain through to the railroads very chary of anything not deliverable to a certain vessel at a certain date.

CAN NOW DIRECT SENDING OF CARS

Winnipeg, Man., March 22.—The amendment of the grain act of Canada grants the grain commissioners power to order the railways to send cars to any locality where there is danger of unsheltered grain becoming damp in the spring and thus suffering great damage. Sir George Foster stated that the minister of agriculture in Saskatchewan had asked for this legislation. VERDUN STILL SCENE OF BIG GERMAN ATTACK

Battle for its Possession Continues With Intensity.

INFANTRY IS HELD IN LEASH

Big Guns Prepare for Further Assault—Russian Boat is Sunk.

The battle for Verdun now is well in its fourth week, and continues with intensity, but at present the infantry is held in leash, while the big guns prepare for a further assault. The powerful German thrust west of the Meuse, which developed early this week, halted when it reached the southern edge of Avocourt Wood. But the activity of the German artillery in this sector, which has been steadily increasing, is a matter of concern to the French command. The situation on the eastern bank of the Meuse is unchanged, but here, too, the artillery fire continues intense near Vaux and Damloup.

ABANDON CAPITAL. London, March 22.—The abandonment of Czernowitz, the capital of Bukovina, by the Austrians, is reported in an Austrian wireless dispatch received here from Rome.

Artillery Duels. Rome, via London, March 22.—The Italian war office communication issued yesterday says: "Along the front from Rovereto to the Gorizia heights, the enemy persists in making great waste of ammunition and small infantry attacks against our advanced line. He was everywhere repulsed."

THOUSANDS OF PARIS PEOPLE ARE HOMELESS

Paris, Tex., March 22.—A conservative estimate of the number of people made homeless by last night's fire in the business districts here was 8,000. This estimate was made by Mayor Ed McCusick. Although the city is without food there is apparently little suffering. The property loss is approximately \$3,000,000. Between 1,500 and 2,000 dwellings are destroyed, in addition to the big business blocks.
