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CORN PRIZES ARE ANNOUNCED

Rules for State Contest Admit Entrants Between 10 and 18 Years.

The rules governing the state acre corn contest of 1916 have been announced from the office of the county superintendent of schools as follows: 1. Boys and girls entering the contest must be between the ages of 10 and 18 years on July 1, 1916.

Prizes A total of \$370 will be awarded as prize money for the winners of the contest. A sweepstakes prize of \$50 will be given for the best yield in the state. The winner of the sweepstakes prize will be entitled to no other prize.

Each contestant must furnish his own seed. No corn shall be planted in order to enter the contest, but it is advisable to plant the best variety of corn that can be secured in the locality.

From time to time circulars will be sent to each contestant giving instructions on how to select the plot, grow corn, and such other information as will be of value to the contestant.
