

FLOOD SWEEPS STREET AWAY AT CROOKSTON

Fears Entertained for Safety of Two Buildings Near By. PART OF FARGO IS UNDER WATER

Railway Tracks and Bridge Inundated Near Wahpeton. (Herald Special Service.) Crookston, Minn., April 1.—More than half the width of west Robert street, near the Sampson's addition bridge over the Red Lako river, slid into the river this morning, closing the street to all traffic.

Trucks Washed Out. Wahpeton, N. D., April 1.—Flood conditions unprecedented prevail in the Red river valley. The flood waters washing over the rails of the Northern Pacific bridge, and just two or three feet below the Great Northern bridge, has caused a serious danger to the Milwaukee line between White Rock and Fairmount.

REPORT CAPTURE

El Paso, April 1.—The capture of Villa is believed by army officers to be only a matter of days. Villa is reported seeking safety in the mountains and is followed here of the actual fighting, although messages filed Thursday and Friday have arrived.

IMMEDIATE CAPTURE EXPECTED

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VILLA'S LAST OUTRAGE

The last outrage placed to the account of Villa occurred at Minaca, a town about ten miles southeast of Guerrero on the Mexican and Orient railroad. Here the Villistas are reported to have murdered Herman Blankenship, a mine foreman and two other foreigners.
