Spanish music was the topic for discussion at the April meeting of the Thursday Musical club, held at the home of Mrs. M. G. Olson, 101 Reeves avenue, at 8 o'clock this afternoon. Mrs. E. E. Sherman had charge of the meeting and she opened the program by reading a paper on "Spanish Music." The music of Spain is of the gypsy type, and for ages it was passed from mouth to mouth so that a great deal of it was never recorded. There are only a few noted composers for this country on this account. Talent in all lines of musical endeavor has been shown, but the divine spot still seems wanting. Several excellent conservatories have been established in Spain, but perhaps the best known is at Madrid, which was established in that city in 1831 by Queen Marie Christine. The opera, Carmen, illustrates the type of Spanish music better than any opera that we have today, although it was not written by a Spanish composer. The works of Mrs. C. F. Marsden gave a paper on Spanish composers and she discussed the lives and works of Thomas Vittoria, Morales and Francisco Barbieri. Vittoria and Morales belong to the period which is classified in music as the golden age and much of their time was given over to the writing of church music. The works of these two men occupy a prominent place in the music used in the Catholic churches today. Barbieri was a composer of the 19th century and consequently his works have a more modern tone. His chief compositions consist of operas, which are very popular among the musical people today. The interest in good music had suffered a decline and Barbieri spent much of his time in traveling from city to city, doing what he could to bring new life to the music of his country.

Mrs. C. F. Wisner discussed the composers, Garcia and Sarasate. Garcia was the most noted vocal teacher the world has ever known and was the instructor of the famous Swedish singer, Jennie Lind. Sarasate is noted for his violin compositions, and is perhaps among the most noted violinists of the world. Miss Grace O'Gorman, a student at Wesley conservatory, sang, "Salvia Maria," one of Garcia's compositions to illustrate his style of composition. Miss O'Gorman also sang "Granada," by Alvarez. A. J. Buchholz, head of the violin department of the conservatory, played the violin obligato to Miss O'Gorman's numbers. Mr. Buchholz also gave two of Sarasate's compositions. "Les

Aileux (melodie) Op. 7, and Zigeunerweisen (Op. 20). The program for the afternoon was completed with the singing of the Spanish song, Chiara, by the high school girls' Glee club, and the instrumental numbers, "Non Secret," by Nario Costa and "Caprice Espagnol," Op. 37, by Moskowski by Mrs. L. C. Harrington.
