Executive Asks That All East Grand Forks Property Be Cleaned for the Summer.
Unsanitary yards and vacant lots used as dumping grounds were the cause of an edict issued yesterday by Mayor Kelleher, providing for a "clean-up" week for East Grand Forks.
No special week has been designated as yet, the mayor awaiting for the citizens to have their property partly cleaned so that the finishing touches will be all that will be made during the clean-up week.
"The condition of the majority of the yards in the city is bad," said the mayor yesterday, "and before I set aside a week for cleaning up I am going to make sure that the removal of unsightly refuse will not be the end of improvement made. The health officer will make certain that the unsanitary places in the city are cleaned up, and unless attention is paid to this at an early date we will not hesitate to prosecute."
