NEW BUILDINGS AT STATE HOSPITAL

Jamestown, N. D., April 24.—Five bids were secured for the \$200,000 worth of new buildings to be constructed at the state hospital for the insane here and it is very probable that the contracts for all of them will be awarded to W. J. Curren of Valley City. He was the lowest bidder upon each bid but as the bids exceeded the appropriations for the buildings the plans will be modified to bring them within the appropriations and then the contract awarded.

The excavation for the basement of the office building is completed, and it is probable that this structure will be started first. The ward building and dining hall will be started and it is expected that the three buildings will be completed early in the summer of 1917.
