ONLY TWO OF CREW SAVED

Steamer S. R. Kirby Broke in Two Without Moment's Warning.

Duluth, Minn., May 10.—When the steamer S. R. Kirby of the North-Western Transportation company of Detroit, Mich., broke in two in the gale which swept Lake Superior Monday, while off Eagle Harbor, 194 miles east of Duluth, only two of her crew of twenty-two escaped.

The steamer broke in two without a moment's warning, according to Second Mate Joseph M. Madsen, who was one of the two men rescued, and who was brought to this port by the steamer H. A. Barwind, Captain William London, of the firm.

"With conciseness, firmness and clarity which is in strong contrast to the pathos with which Wilhelmstrasse announced its backdown, President Wilson maintains the position he took in the preceding note," writes Stephen Pichon, former minister in the Petit Journal.
