

RAIN GENERAL IN NORTHWEST

Crop Prospects Greatly Improved—Most Sections of State Drenched.

Rain was general yesterday and today all over the northwest, every section of the state being drenched with a steady downpour, which began Sunday afternoon.

Crop prospects throughout the state are greatly improved on account of the rain, and a large part of the damage resulting from the severe dust storms last week is repaired, according to reports received from various sections of the state.

The greater part of the wheat crop is in the ground in most localities, and moisture was badly needed to assist it in starting growth.

The wet weather, however, will cause a delay of a few days in completing the spring work, but according to reports received from Fargo, Mandan and other points in the southern part of the state, the work is already well along, and no damage will result. Western and northern North Dakota points send in similar reports.

NEW METHOD IS ADOPTED

Rome, May 15.—A new method of making bread recently adopted in Italy has proved a great success. It is found that 800 pounds of grain produces a ton of what is termed "natural bread."

In the process the grain is sifted and washed; it is then left for 48 to 60 hours in a warm bath, where it germinates and begins to sprout. When the germinating process has gone far enough the grain is crushed in a machine and made into dough, which is passed into the oven.

The natural bread is grayish in color, with an agreeable odor, and has much higher nutritive properties than white bread, according to the Corriere Della Sera. Its eating qualities and digestibility are shown by the preference given it by Italians who have tried it.
