FORDVILLE TEAM TO PLAY HERE THURSDAY NIGHT

Lineup of Two Teams Announced—Game Begins at 6:30 P. M.

Fordville is scheduled to meet the Grand Forks ball team Thursday evening at 6:30 o'clock at Dacotah park. This is the first week game scheduled for Grand Forks since the opening of the season.

Fordville has been winning the greater number of its games and on Monday battled the strong Park River team to a scoreless tie. On Thursday, the visitors probably will line up with Nette at left field, Mongoven at second, P. Aafedt, catcher, Luther at first, Fanning at third, Johnson at short, H. Aafedt at center field, and Looker at right field. Kelfenheim is booked to pitch but he may shift with the third baseman, allowing Fanning to take the mound. Both are purported to be good twirlers.

Gill will be back in the Grand Forks lineup for Thursday evening's game. At the present time he is at Inaker. Gill was out of the Arkyie game.

Other positions in Grand Forks' lineup likely will be filled as follows: Lowe at first, Gill will take second, Each and Jackson will be at short and third, J. Each, Shannon and Newark will be in the field. Braseth will catch and O'Reilly will be on the mound.

Another game will be played here Sunday when the fast Minto team will journey here for the first game against Grand Forks.

On July 2 and 4 the Grafton team of the Valley league will be seen in four games here, a double-header being played on the holiday. Independence day will be marked by morning and afternoon games, the second game being preceded by a field meet. The fastest runners of the two teams will be pitted against each other. A ball throwing contest and other events will be arranged by the management of the two teams. Prizes will be hung up for the winners.

As Grafton drubbed the locals early in the season, the Grand Forks team is preparing to take at least three of the games.

Last summer when the middleweight belt was in question and no one seemed sure who had the proper claim to it, Clabby and McGorty both were holding the title and that all claimants must consult them. They managed to exasperate one another very much in this way, especially as it was hard to show that either had the shine over the other. If anything, Jimmy Clabby now has the bulge on Eddie, having won one of their three meets on points and another on a foul. The first fight between the two was a ten-round draw.
