CENSORSHIP ON NEWS PLANNED BY WAR OFFICE

STATE GUARD IN CAMP AT FORT LINCOLN

Grand Forks Contingent Reached Reservation Sunday Afternoon.

MUCH EQUIPMENT STILL LACKING

Boys Expect to Leave Front Within the Next Six Days.

(By Staff Correspondent.) Bismarck, N. D., Fort Lincoln, June 26.—With but six days rations drawn and rumors among the officers that the North Dakota National Guard will move by Thursday prospects for immediate service, now appear pretty certain.

With companies D and E getting into camp shortly after six o'clock Sunday night, the entire regiment numbering 975 enlisted men went into the first day of training for border duty, prepared for hard work. The company A of Bismarck was the first on the ground, F of Mandan, and K of Dickinson, followed in the afternoon, and shortly after G of Valley City, B of Fargo, H of Jamestown and the band and hospital corps, moved into camp.

Local Men Arrive. The train on which Company C, of Grafton, M. of Grand Forks, the machine gun company of Grand Forks, L. of Hillsboro, and I. of Wahpeton arrived shortly after 4 o'clock Sunday.

Equipment Lacking. There was considerable confusion attending the first day's work and there is a general shortage of equipment, mostly tents, due to the big increase in the regiment. All of the companies are bringing recruits in uniforms of every style, and some without any.

The train on which the Grand Forks contingent rode was met all along the line with enthusiasm, Jamestown receiving it with a band.

RICAUT REMOVED FROM COMMAND

Carranza Removes Him Because He Did Not Fire on U. S. Troops, says Report

Laredo, Texas, June 26.—It is reported that Carranza removed General Alfredo Ricaut, commander of the Northeastern border patrol, and reinstated General Emiliano Nafarrete, now at Tampico.

The change is said to have been due to Ricaut's failure to attack the American forces which crossed the river in pursuit of bandits, June 17.

CARRANZA HAS ONE MORE CHANCE TO PREVENT WAR; WASHINGTON PREPARES TO RUSH LARGE NUMBER OF STATE TROOPS TO BORDER AT ONCE

CARRANZA IS RUSHING MEN TO RAILROAD

Will Endeavor to Hold the Mexican Central Against American Invasion.

'BLOOD' DEMANDED IN SALTILLO PAPER

Inhabitants of Northern Durango Are in a Starving Condition.

El Paso, Texas, June 26.—Carranza troops in Northern Chihuahua are being concentrated hastily, and in force along the line of the Mexican Central railroad between Juarez and Chihuahua City, according to private dispatches today.

These messages said that eight troops trains packed with soldiers to be distributed between Villa Ahumada and Laguna, left the state capital last night.

Will Hold Line. Military men assume that the Mexican plan contemplates sparing no effort to hold the railroad as the main artery of transportation in case of hostilities.

Reports state that thousands of people in Northern Mexico are on the verge of starvation and that the economic situation is fast becoming worse.

Refugees from Mexico City arriving today said that at stations in Northern Durango, men and women who no longer had clothing to cover themselves, crowded about the train, crying for food. They fought as beasts over bits of oranges peeling a fellow traveler threw from the coach.

To show the extent of anti-American feeling, the refugees displayed newspapers, one of which, La Reforma, a semi-official paper of Saltillo, carried an article captioned "blood," which said:

"Above all, do not forget that in time of national need, humanity is a crime and frightfulness a virtue."

"Pull out the eyes, smother out the hearts, tear open the breasts, drink—if you can—the blood in the skulls of the invaders from the cities of Yanketland."

CASEMENT PLACED ON TRIAL TODAY

London, June 26.—Sir Roger Casement, accused of instigating the Irish rebellion, was placed on trial charged with high treason today. A formal plea of not guilty was entered. The jury soon was selected.

WARREN MILLERS WIN RATE CASE

Canadian Pacific Violated Ruling, Says Commerce Commission.

Washington, June 26.—The interstate commerce commission held today that the Canadian Pacific railroad violated the long and short haul provision of the railroad rate act in charging a higher rate of grain from the province of Saskatchewan, Canada, to intermediate points in Minnesota, than it charged to Duluth. The decision upholds the Warren, Minn., millers in complaints against the rates to Warren, based on the rate to Duluth, plus the rate back to Warren.

COMPANY I ON WAY TO CAMP

Crookston Guards Given a Rousing Farewell last Evening at Depot.

(Herald Special Service.) Crookston, Minn., June 26.—The ladies and the residential sections of the city were deserted last evening when the citizens of Crookston gathered to witness the departure of Company I. At the armory the early part of the evening, thousands of residents thronged to bid farewell to the boys and Dr. R. Cooper Bailey of the Presbyterian church, made a short but inspiring address, complimenting the boys of Company I, for the loyalty they have shown.

Practically every resident of the city was at the depot and demonstration followed demonstration, as the 85 members of the local guard bade farewell to friends and relatives.

The Crookston and Warren bands assisted in the parting farewells with patriotic melodies. The boys of Company I were transported to the Twin Cities in two tourist cars, leaving here at 10:30 last evening. They will join the other guards of Minnesota at the concentration camp at Fort Snelling, to await the call to proceed to the border.

DE FACTO GOVERNMENT MUST GIVE U. S. PRISONERS FREEDOM AND MAKE DEFINITE STAND AS TO INTENTIONS

American Officials Anxiously Await Developments—Twenty Soldiers are Known to Have Been Killed at Carrizal—Captain Morey Rescued.

Washington, June 26.—Carranza's answer to the American note, upon which depends whether a state of war shall exist, is expected hourly. It is understood Wilson plans to tell congress if Carranza follows his avowed policy, that Mexico is waging war against American forces protecting the border.

The report that Villa has joined Carranza is unconfirmed. EMBARGO ON ALL COMMERCE. A virtual embargo on commerce between the United States and Mexico, pending determination of their future relations, is being planned by the administration.

Washington, June 26.—The American note to the de facto government reached Mexico City last night. Special Agent Rodgers arranged to deliver it immediately. This was reported in a cablegram from Rodgers, received today.

There was nothing in the message indicating how the demand for the release of the prisoners taken at Carrizal and for the return of policy by Carranza was received or when a reply might be expected. Six Central and South American republics, through their representatives, inquired formally today of Mexican Ambassador Designate Arredondo, whether his government would accept offers of mediation of the crisis between the United States and Mexico.

Washington, June 26.—Carranza has one more chance to prevent an open break with the United States. He can release the 17 prisoners taken at the Carrizal engagement and place his government on record immediately as to its future intentions toward American troops in Mexico, as demanded in President Wilson's note, sent forward in reply to the de facto government's note in which Carranza admitted having orders to General Trevino to attack the American forces moving any direction except North.

With this situation facing the Washington government, officials waited expectantly today. Meanwhile preparations are being rushed to have large forces of militia converge to the border within two days.

By Friday or Saturday, the United States will be in a much better position to strike if it is decided that this is the only course.

Twenty Three Dead. Field Headquarters, Mex., June 26.—(By wireless to Columbia, N. M.)—Twenty three American soldiers are known to have lost their lives at Carrizal, according to a report to General Pershing from Major Jenkins, command the 11th cavalry column ordered to scour the country for survivors.

The report told of the rescue of Captain Morey, after he had made a daring stand in the face of heavy Mexican odds.

MEXICAN TROOPS OCCUPY TOWN. Chihuahua City, Mex., June 26.—On the heels of the American evacuation of Santa Rosalia and Bachajon, General Trevino occupied these points with his troops, issuing strict orders that any attempt of Pershing's men to return south must be forcibly prevented.

VILLA AND CARRANZA AGREE. El Paso, Texas, June 26.—Information reached here from apparently reliable sources that Francisco Villa, until recently at Santa Rosalia, has reached an agreement with the de facto government and has been so far induced to induce his followers to join the Carranza forces. Army officers listened to the reports with interest.

DE FACTO TROOPS ARE MOVING. San Antonio, Texas, June 26.—News reaching army headquarters here today indicates that the Mexican forces along the Rio Grande from Matamoros to Juarez either have withdrawn their main strength from the border or are preparing to do it. It also indicated that these troops are taking station at strategic points along the line well south of the border, where the varied junction will allow of the rapid handling of troops or where the topography of the country would permit a strong defense.

Reports of Another Fight. Columbia, N. M.—Reports are in circulation that another clash between American and Carranza's troops occurred in the vicinity of Villa Ahumada, but army officers have not confirmed it.

El Paso.—Mexican officials here and at Juarez said they heard nothing of the reported fighting at Villa Ahumada.

AUSTRIANS QUIT OFFENSIVE IN SOUTHERN TYROL AND ARE FALLING BACK, HOTLY PURSUED BY ITALIANS

VERDUN FIGHT IS NOW IN THE CRUCIAL STAGE

New German Assaults Made on Thiaumont Works—Many Russians Taken.

London, June 26.—The Austrians definitely abandoned their offensive in Southern Tyrol and are falling back, according to reports today from the Italian front. Evidence by a decided flagging in the Austrian aggressive, which began appearing when the Russian offensive in the east got under headway, now is supplemented by Rome's announcement that the Austrians are retreating along a front some 20 miles in the Adige sector. The Italians are hotly pursuing.

with new German assaults on Thiaumont works north of the town.

Important Fighting. Berlin, June 26 (via London).—Fighting activity in the western theatre on the front occupied by the British and the North wing of the French army is important and has been so for the past two days, says the official statement of the German headquarters today.

Heavy fighting continues in the district west of Sokul, on the eastern front, where the Russians are attempting to stir their march westward. The war office today reports success by the Germans near Zeluzna, in this district.

Since June 18, it is announced, over 11,000 Russian prisoners, two cannons and 64 machine guns have been taken.

Night Attack. Paris, June 26.—In a night attack the French captured part of a German trench between Fumin and Chamols Woods in the Verdun sector. The German attack was repulsed. Thiaumont was retaken, according to the official statement by the French war office today. A heavy artillery duel is in progress west of the Meuse.

Austrian Retreat. Rome, June 26.—The general retreat of the Austrians in the Tyrol district over a distance of 20 miles in the Adige sector, was announced by the Italian war office today. The statement says the Italian army is in a crucial stage, continued last night pressing the pursuit vigorously.
