

RELEASE OF U. S. TROOPERS BY CARRANZA MAKES BREAK WITH MEXICO ONLY LESS IMMINENT

NO CHANGE IN POLICY OF U. S. IS CONSIDERED

Official Notification is Received by Washington Government.

PREPARATIONS FOR WAR WILL CONTINUE

Border Patrol Will also be Maintained at Full Strength.

Washington, June 29.—The official announcement of Carranza's order releasing the American troops captured at Carrizal reached the state department today from Special Agent Rodgers, at Mexico City.

Mexican Ambassador Designate Arrived today received a message from the Foreign Minister Arrullar confirming the report that Carranza has issued orders to General Trevino to release the 23 American troopers captured at Carrizal and since held prisoners at Chihuahua City.

Even should the Mexican reply disclaim any hostile intention and withdraw the orders to the Carranza military, the border patrol will be maintained at the strength contemplated while any danger from the bandits is continued.

Train Delayed. El Paso, June 29.—The train carrying the American prisoners released from the Chihuahua penitentiary had not reached Juarez at 7:30 a. m. and it was reported that it might not arrive before 9 o'clock.

SHIPPING RATES ORDERED CHANGED (By Associated Press.) Washington, June 29.—Holding that winter competition between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts has been completely destroyed under war conditions, the Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered transcontinental railroads to revise their rates from the East to the Pacific coast by September 1, so that they shall not be lower than rates to intermediate points.

BANDITS ON WAY. Santa Fe, N. M., June 29.—Four of the five remaining Villista bandits captured in the Columbus raid and sentenced to hang, were taken from the penitentiary here today and are now on their way to Deming, where they will be hanged early Friday on the same scaffold used for their two fellow raiders on June 9.

SHARP DEMAND FOR APOLOGY IS MADE TO AUSTRIA IN THE PETROLITE CASE BY THE U. S.

Conduct of Austrian Submarine Commander Denounced in the Latest Note Sent Eight Days Ago and Just Made Public by the American Government.

Washington, June 29.—Austria's probable reply to the United States demand for reparation for the Austrian submarine attack on the American tank steamer Petrolite was the subject of widespread comment here today. The text of the new American note dispatched to Vienna eight days ago was made public by the state department yesterday.

After reciting the circumstances of the attack the note says: "The conduct of the submarine commander showed lack of judgment, self control, or willful intent amounting to utter disregard of the rights of a neutral."

MOTOR TRUCKS ARE ORDERED Sufficient to Transport Supplies for Large Army in Mexico.

New York, June 29.—Colonel A. L. Smith, U. S. A., quartermaster of the department of the east, announced today that the war department had ordered Friday for 4,000 automobile trucks for the motor transport service along the border.

Washington, June 29.—The correctness of the captain of the Petrolite is entirely at variance with the report of the submarine commander. IRISH KNIGHT WILL DIE FOR HIGH TREASON

Jury Returns Verdict of Guilty Within Hour After Trial.

CHIEF JUSTICE GIVES SENTENCE

Private Soldier, Alleged Accomplice, is Released by Court.

London, June 29.—Sir Roger Casement was found guilty of high treason, and sentenced to death today. The ending of the historic trial came this afternoon the jury bringing in a verdict against the Irish knight in less than an hour.

Soldier Released. After Casement was sentenced, Daniel Bailey, the private soldier held as his accomplice was placed in the dock. The chief justice directed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty and Bailey was discharged.

APPEAL MADE TO MEN OF LAW

Are Urged to be Moral Leaders in Present World Crisis.

Oshkosh, Wis., June 29.—An appeal to the legal profession for moral leadership in the impending world crisis which he sees as a result of the European war was made tonight at the meeting of the Wisconsin bar association by Justice M. B. Resenberry, of the Wisconsin supreme court.

"This country," he said, "grown rich and indifferent, impatient of the slightest discipline, totally oblivious of everything but the business and pleasure of the hour, untrained, profane, unorganized, almost wholly individualistic in thought and action, is practically without national consciousness. We think in terms of our respective localities, and at most our political vision is limited to the boundaries of our state."

LATE RETURNS FROM STATE SHOW M'CUMBER AND FRAZIER LEADING BY SUBSTANTIAL PLURALITIES

M'CUMBER AND FRAZIER LEAD IN THE COUNTY

T. B. Elton Seems Assured of State's Attorney Nomination.

MORE PRECINCTS ARE TO REPORT

Don McDonald Has Lead Over Lodmell for Register of Deeds.

With 50 out of 61 precincts in Grand Forks county reporting on the head of the ticket, the indications are that Senator P. J. McCumber and Lynn J. Frazier carried the county. Fraine and Burdick ran close in the county, while Smith, as in other counties, was hopelessly out of the race.

The 50 precincts reporting on the head of the ticket gave: Frazier 807, Fraine 761 and Smith 30. In the senatorial race, the same precincts give McCumber 770, Hanna 640, Nestos 630 and Midtbo 98.

In 46 precincts, Mr. Elton is given a total of 1,030 votes, while J. E. Wineman has 552 and John Ogren 432. Don McDonald is leading A. M. Lodmell by 126.

NO RELIEF IS PROVIDED IN THE HAY BILL

Aid for Dependent Families and Release of Married Men Cut Out.

TRANSFERRED TO FEDERAL SERVICE

Are Taken Over for Period of National Emergency Only.

Washington, June 29.—The Senate today approved and sent to White House the conference report on the Hay resolution authorizing the president to draft into the federal service all national guardsmen, taking the prescribed oath.

KANSAS TROOPS ARE MUSTERED IN

Fort Riley, Kans., June 29.—The second infantry regiment, Kansas national guard, became a unit of the federal army today and will be the first of the state troops to respond to the call issued by Major General Thomas Barry, commander of the central department, for entrainment to the border.

BURDICK AND HANNA WERE G. O. P. RUNNERS UP; BURKE AND M'ARTHUR FOR "DEMS"

Governor. Frazier... 9,705 Burdick... 9,288 Fraine... 3,240

U. S. Senator. McCumber... 8,234 Hanna... 3,802 Nestos... 3,941

Returns received up to 3 o'clock this afternoon show the standings as above.

Porter J. McCumber has won a remarkable victory over Hanna and Nestos in the race for the republican nomination for senator, piling up a total vote nearly as great as the combined total vote of his opponents.

There is nothing definite on other state positions, except that if the balance of the counties to report maintain relative positions of railroad commission candidates, commissioner of agriculture, commissioner of insurance, the league candidates have been nominated.

OTHER RESULTS

Outstanding features down the line with the state ticket of the republicans is the victory of Attorney General H. J. Linde over Wm. Langner of Mandan; Tom Hall's easy defeat of J. L. Hjort for secretary of state; A. P. Kraabel's wide margin over candidate Adamson for governor; Walter Taylor's defeat of S. O. Olness for insurance commissioner; the prospect that the present railroad commission has been renominated; and that Robert Flint has been nominated over T. N. Hagen as Democratic candidate for commissioner of agriculture.

JUDICIAL BALLOT

For justices of the supreme court in a field of eight candidates, Messrs. Robinson, Birdzell and Grace, candidates endorsed by the Nonpartisan league, are polling almost the total Nonpartisan league strength, running close together, and the prospects are that they will be the highest candidates.

BURKE AND M'ARTHUR

In the democratic primaries, John Burke was given very little difficulty in obtaining the senatorial nomination, defeating F. O. Holstrom by at least three to one, and probably four to one.

Democratic gubernatorial returns are incomplete, but McArthur has a lead at present, and unless strong sectional returns should overturn the general balloting, he should be elected.

In every county where Nonpartisans are organized their legislative candidates have taken the lead, and indications are that at least eighty per cent of their candidates for the house of representatives have been nominated.

Foster County. Carrington, N. D., June 29.—Ten precincts in Foster county give the following: Nestos 34, Hanna 32, McCumber 246, Burdick 123, Fraine 31, Frazier 222, Sorlie 86, Kraabel 240, Hjort 29, Hill 201, Kostitzky 185, Jorgenson 140, Steen 158, Linde 31, Langer 280, Taylor 124, Olness 205, Flint 121, Hagen 221, Johnson 194, Mann 124, Stutzman 111, Andahl 162, Anderson 184, Belick 178.

Lynn Frazier, non-partisan league candidate, has won the republican nomination. Burdick gives him hot opposition on the face of returns so far available, but such a small percentage of the rural vote has been reported, and Frazier is running so strong in country precincts, that nothing but a comfortable majority for the Hoopie man is in sight. Morton county, for instance, on which figures were still absent at 1 o'clock, is reported running strongly for non-partisans. Mercer, Oliver and Dunn are strongly non-partisan. Divick, joining Williams, Burdick's home county, went for Frazier, and with such conditions prevailing, and with practically the entire vote still to be reported coming from rural precincts, Frazier's nomination is generally conceded.

That non-partisan strength may have carried the entire state ticket to nominations is also possible election outcome. Hall and Kraabel are nominated without question. Langer and Linde, Jorgenson and Kostitzky, are running close, with Linde and Jorgenson slightly stronger in non-partisan counties, than other anti-league candidates. The slope vote will determine these contests.

LEGISLATOR NOMINATED

By Governor, Lynn J. Frazier, Nonpartisan league's candidate, was announced in yesterday's primaries. His lead over U. L. Burdick will be around 5,000. J. H. Fraine has finished a bad third, while George Smith polled a very light vote.

For congress in the First district, H. T. Helgeson has been nominated to succeed himself, defeating F. T. Cuthbert. Cuthbert made a good run in the cities, but Helgeson's stronghold in the rural precincts puts him over with a good margin.

Justice Flak seems assured of nomination, but beyond that nothing is yet definite, returns being so scattered and the vote being apparently divided between four other candidates for lieutenant governor; Walter Taylor's defeat of S. O. Olness for insurance commissioner; the prospect that the present railroad commission has been renominated; and that Robert Flint has been nominated over T. N. Hagen as Democratic candidate for commissioner of agriculture.
