PRESIDENT OF CHINA ANNOUNCES FORMATION OF NEW CABINET

FRENCH HOLD LINE AGAINST FURIOUS DRIVE

Terrific Attack Delivered by the Germans Near Hill 304.

TEUTONS SUSTAIN SEVERE LOSSES

Claim to Have Repulsed the British at Various Points of the Front.

Paris, June 30.—In a terrific attack upon the French positions east of Hill 304, in the Verdun section, the Germans captured and fortified works in the first line of French trenches after the garrison had been literally buried under a storm of shells. The position was recaptured by a brilliant French counter-attack, according to the official statement of the French war office.

Other Attacks.

The Germans also delivered a powerful attack on the French positions in Avacourt wood and east of Hill 304, but all their efforts are declared to have been checked with heavy losses to the attackers. Considerable activity is reported on the front from Neuport to the Aisne.

Allies Repulsed.

Berlin, June 30. (via London).—Attacks by the British and French at various places along the western front yesterday and last night were repulsed by the German troops, the war office announced today.

TROOPS GIVEN TREATMENT FOR TYPHOID FEVER

Inoculation of North Dakota Regiment in Progress at Camp.

RECRUITS COMING IN TO THE COLORS

Command Now Numbers Over 1,000—More Equipment Needed

(By Staff Correspondent.) Fort Lincoln, N. D., June 30.—Inoculating of the troops of the First North Dakota regiment is under way; the work began on Co. A, and will be continued until all have received one treatment, then physicians will begin again with Company A.

The men are being given a physical examination at the time inoculated, and it is not thought likely at this time many of them will be returned. All of the recruiting officers are now in camp, with the exception of Lieutenant Harley Hanson, of Co. M. He has received his orders and is expected in today. Recruits were brought in with all of the officers, the Minot company bringing its strength up to 134 men.

One Thousand Strong. The regiment now numbers considerably over 1,000; all the equipment on hand has been issued and much more is needed. However a car is on the way and will be here on Monday. The monotony of camp life has settled down on the regiment, as orders to move are awaited. The men are given five hours a day of drill, besides inspection, guard mount and parade. However, they are keeping up their spirits and health.

Letters of Sympathy Received by Accused Man in Court.

Waukegan, Ill., June 30.—Further efforts to strengthen the theory of the defense that Marion Lambert, the Lake Forest school girl, committed suicide with poison were made today in the trial of Will Orpet, accused of his sweetheart's murder.

To Call Alienists.

W. Krohn, an alienist will probably be called late today to testify with reference to the psychological phases of Orpet's so-called brain fog on discovering that Marion was lying dead in the snow in the woods.

Engineer On Stand.

Gale M. Brooks, a civil engineer, who said he surveyed and mapped Heim's woods and the vicinity, took the stand for the defense. Maps were produced and explained. One of its purposes was to show that the couple could have been seen in the woods from the interurban station, and that the woods, therefore, would never have been selected for a deliberately planned murder.

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MEXICAN FACTIONS SAID TO FAVOR DRASTIC DEMANDS IN REGARD TO INTENTIONS OF THE UNITED STATES

WOULD FORCE WAR OR PEACE TO AN ISSUE

Washington Government Would Favor Delay to Perfect Position.

NO TIME LIMIT NAMED IN NOTE

The Situation Remains Unchanged Save for Greater Tension.

Washington, June 30.—Private advice reaching Washington from a reliable source in Mexico City today said that Carranza and his advisers had determined to stand by the orders to General Trevino to attack American troops in Mexico moving in any direction except toward the border and that no way was seen to avoid a break with the United States.

No Hurry Planned.

The Mexican situation stood today virtually where it was 24 hours ago, except that more national guardsmen are hurrying to the border, and the time allowed Carranza to declare his intentions toward the American troops in Mexico is growing shorter.

World Like Delay.

No time limit was set in President Wilson's note making the demand. There are indications that the administration would welcome a further delay of a few days. This would permit not only the concentration of a stronger force to meet the need of actual hostilities, if they should come, but would also permit the gathering of the supplies, the mobilization of transport facilities and the strengthening of aerial forces.

Officials Worried.

Washington, June 30.—Officials today showed deep interest in the apparently authentic reports from Mexico City that Carranza and his advisers had decided to stand by the original orders to General Trevino not to permit troops to move in any direction except north.

RAILROADS NOW PRESENTING CASE

New York, June 30.—Presentation of the eastern railroads' side of the case was begun here yesterday in reply to the petition filed with the interstate commerce commission by the Silk Association of America, which asks for a reduction of freight rates on raw silk. The hearings are before Henry Thurlell, an examiner for the federal body.

FOUR VILLA BANDITS PAY PENALTY FOR THE RAID ON COLUMBUS N. M.

Go to Execution Calmly—One Prays God to Forgive Enemies—Tension Along Border is Generally Reduced Mexican Trooper Alleged Killed.

Deming, N. M., June 30.—Four Villistas who participated in the Columbus raid were executed by hanging in the county jail here today. The men were executed in pairs. Ensenio Renteria and Taurino Garcia were placed on the scaffold first. They were pronounced dead 20 minutes later. Jose Rangel and Juan Castillo had their necks broken, death came to both almost instantly.

The four men were calm as they went to death. Rangel smoked a cigarette when the noose was adjusted. None would speak except Garcia, who exclaimed as he was led to execution: "I hope God will forgive my enemies."

This completes the disposition of the cases of the Columbus raiders. Guardsmen Gather. San Antonio, Tex., June 30.—While thousands of national guardsmen were moving over converging lines today toward the border stations, extraordinary precautions being taken to prevent the exact routings and schedules of the numerous special trains from becoming widely known.

General Funston was instructed by the secretary of war to exercise the utmost precaution of concealing details of the mobilization. The general managers of all railroads carrying troops have been requested not to make public the movements of trains.

Mexican Killed.

El Paso, Tex., June 30.—A Mexican line rider belonging to the Carranza customs service was shot and killed on American territory yesterday by soldiers who fired across the Rio Grande into Mexican territory near Ysleta, twelve miles east of El Paso, according to a report received by General Gonzales in Juarez today.

Troopers in Hospital.

El Paso, Tex., June 30.—Tension which gripped the border since the Carrizal encounter relaxed perceptibly today as the result of the safe return to American soil of 23 troopers of the Tenth cavalry and an American scout taken prisoner in the engagement.

Stories told by the soldiers that they had suffered no ill treatment at the hands of the troops of the defunct Mexican government and that every effort had been made to control the violence manifested by the inflamed civil population at Villa Ahumada and Chihuahua City where the prisoners were stoned and jeered at, had a marked effect here.

In official circles in Juarez, the Mexican city across the Rio Grande, the news dispatches that the return of the negro soldiers had averted the possibility of immediate retaliatory steps by the United States, were received with obvious satisfaction.

Andrea Garcia, the Mexican consul at El Paso, expressed himself as believing the first step looking toward a peaceful solution of the border problem had been taken and that others would follow shortly.

The twenty-three troopers released by the Mexicans yesterday, today are in Fort Bliss hospital, where they will be held until it is certain they have not contracted any of the diseases now prevalent in northern Mexico while held in prison. A gift of 23 watermelons to the negro troopers was presented today by a Fort Bliss commission house.

No Damage to Line.

Columbus, N. M., June 30.—Scout detachments sent out to investigate the reports that the Carranzistas are concentrating large bodies of men near Guzman, informed General Parshing there is no cause for apprehension, according to reports received here. They found no evidence of Mexicans preparing to cut the American line communication. However, the garrison at Guzman, they said had become somewhat increased by cavalry arriving from the south.

NAVY PLANS GIVEN BOOST TO COLUMBUS

Dreadnaughts and Battle Cruisers Provided For by Committee.

Washington, June 30.—The senate naval committee agreed unanimously to amendments to the naval bill providing for the construction of four dreadnaughts and four battle cruisers in 1917 and completion in three years of the \$500,000,000 building program urged by the navy general board. This is the program recommended by a sub-committee after conference with Secretary Daniels.

The committee added an amendment to the sub-committee report providing for re-organization of the naval guard re-organization effected in the army re-organization act. The bill will be reported to the senate Saturday or Monday and be called up for consideration next week.

Chairman Tillman of the committee has designated Senator Swanson to have charge of the measure on the floor.

PRICES ON MEATS WENT UP IN MONTH

Washington, June 30.—Prices paid producers of meat animals—hogs, cattle, sheep and chickens—increased .2 per cent from May 15 to June 15 and were 16.7 per cent higher on June 15 than they were a year ago and 12.3 per cent higher than the average of the last six years on that date.

The department of agriculture announcement today showed prices of hogs June 15 averaged \$8.21 a hundred pounds, an increase of \$1.41 from a year ago and \$1.11 higher than the six-year average. Beef cattle increased 10 cents a hundred pounds during the month and averaged \$6.91, an increase of 71 cents over a year ago and \$1.24 over the six-year average. Sheep declined 13 cents per hundred pounds during the month, averaging \$6.54; an increase of \$1.10 over a year ago and \$1.98 over the six-year average.

PROTECTION FOR EXPORTERS OF U. S.

Washington, June 30.—Means of protecting American exporters against unscrupulous foreign competition were discussed at a conference today when Secretary Redfield, Chairman Davies of the federal trade commission, Assistant Secretary Peters of the treasury and representatives of the state, labor, interior and agriculture departments.

The meeting was called as a result of complaints that American manufacturers are suffering from illegal practices of dealers in European and South American markets. Further conferences will be held and protective legislation sought.

Former Premier of Manitoba is Charged With Conspiracy.

Kansas City, Mo., June 30.—The plan of J. E. Brady, judge of the police court of Kansas City, Kan., to obtain convicted wife-beater to a pole, where pedestrians in the uptown district might see them, probably will not go through after all. Mayor C. W. Green came out against the idea today and Judge Brady learned such punishment probably could not be worked out under the state laws.

"Judge Brady will send all wife-beaters to the rock pile hereafter and make them work instead of permitting them to remain idle in the city workhouse," Mayor Green said.
