WEEKLY GRAIN LETTER

St. Paul Grain Exchange, Tuesday, June 13, 1916.—The wheat market the past week has been a genuine bearish affair. What few rallies we have had were not sustained. Everything in the way of news, both foreign and domestic, has been unfavorable to holders of wheat. The only encouragement to longs during the week was the government report published Thursday. On Friday the market made some response to the bullish government figures. Speculative interest is at very low ebb, however, and the prospect of a movement of new wheat to overlap the current movement of old wheat appears as a severe check on speculative sentiment.

The bears are still confident that the new crop plus the carryover will result in burdensome supplies and if the export demand continues as indifferent as it is, they are likely to be right, but the "influences" on the other side are just as numerous and deserve just as much consideration. It is fair to assume that the winter wheat crop has improved somewhat since the report was taken, and all things considered the government figures are perhaps a shade too low, but in figuring this year's production, it must be borne in mind that none of it is in the bins and that the spring wheat crop has to survive all the season's vicissitudes. In the southwest the harvest is on.

With the new crop coming on it will not be long before the wheat market should begin to feel the weight of the offerings. The market has been without any pressure of importance, a factor which has been a most important influence in the strong undertone the market has displayed until recently, but from now on hedges may be expected to increase, and as the present visible is large, diminishing but slowly, the load
