EDITOR TRIBUNE.—The Willmar Creamery and Dairy Association has engaged for its butter-maker Mr. C. K. Christenson of the Town of Burbank. Mr. Christenson comes highly recommended, having letters of recommendation from the State Dairy school and from the managers of the Grove City creamery, and also from commission men of New York.

The Association has rented the Central creamery building, and the directors are now, under the direction of Mr. Christenson, at work thoroughly cleaning and overhauling the building. They have bought \$600.00 worth of the latest improved machinery and as soon as the cans arrive will commence receiving milk. The directors also wish to say to the patrons not to be discouraged on account of present delay, but that the creamery will start up in better shape than before, and, as we have very encouraging reports from the commission men in New York that they will handle all our butter not at big figures but at fair prices, we intend to help all those who will patronize the Association.


