Our old and esteemed friend W. A. Krause, editor and proprietor of Moody Co. Enterprise, Flandrau, S. D., has an editorial on the silver question and partly in answer to our comments on Senator Allison's position on this issue. Bro. Krause seems to believe in free coinage of silver, but fears that the United States can not get it without co-operation of the Latin Union and Germany. He thinks that with less than \$100,000,000 of gold we can not keep the influx of silver under free coinage at the ratio of 16 to 1 at parity. Now if Bro. Krause means that the parity shall be maintained by redeeming silver freely in gold we agree with him. Nay more, we cannot keep at parity without national bankruptcy our present stock of silver money under the unlimited gold redemption policy. But under free coinage of silver and as full legal tender for any amount, as it was prior to 1873, no \$100,000,000 of gold or any other quantity will be necessary to keep silver at parity. This simple fact is constantly overlooked by many intelligent people. The instant that the law says that 412½ grains of standard silver coined into a dollar is full legal tender for any amount, that instant a silver dollar needs no redeemer. It is the thing itself. Its value does not depend on the value of the metal in the dollar nor on its redeemability in gold. Its purchasing value will ultimately depend on the quantity of units coined and in circulation relative to demand for money in the nation. But the United States mints cannot coin silver enough for many years to come to flood this country with silver dollars. Mind you, free silverites do not ask that 412½ grains of silver bullion be a dollar. But for many years to come the value of a silver dollar under free coinage will really depend on its full legal tender quality. And that is amply sufficient. A dollar that will discharge debt and pay taxes, will not depreciate while we live. Bro. Krause. The demand for dollars to do this with, is so urgent and pressing, and will be for years to come, that the whole world's stock of gold and silver, if brought here, could not be coined fast enough to overstock the supply so as to depreciate the dollar. But, Bro. Krause, did you ever reflect that there isn't a country on the face of the globe where they have more money, or if free coinage, more money metal than they want? This flood of silver is wholly imaginary. It exists nowhere. But even grant for the sake of argument that it does exist and comes here. What then? Are other nations going to give us their silver money for nothing? We think not. They would undoubtedly take some goods for it, or wheat, or pork, or cotton. And our farmers would get the silver of course and have it coined into dollars and pay their debts, pay their mortgages and own their homes, pay their store bills, and doctor bills, and subscription for their county newspaper, and as there was a regular flood of this silver they might have something left to buy a suite of clothes from the tailor, or a suite of furniture from the furniture store, and so forth. Now, Bro. Krause, do you think this would hurt me, or you, or any other common business man? If not, why are you afraid of it? Why is any sensible man afraid of it? You can't tell Bro. Krause, can you?
