### DAWSON BELL.

The Central Hotel Landlord Passes Suddenly Away.

Everybody was startled yesterday forenoon by learning of the sudden death of D. Bell, Esq., the wellknown host of the Central Hotel. He arose in the morning apparently well and ate his breakfast as usual. About eight o'clock he was suddenly taken with a sharp pain in his left side, and became immediately almost helpless. He was carried to his room and medical aid was summoned. Vitality, however, was evidently exhausted as he passed away about nine o'clock a. m.

Mr. Bell was born in West Virginia about 65 years ago. He spent his younger days in the State of Ohio. In the year 1860 he came to Minnesota, and for twenty-five years was engaged in the mercantile business. The first hotel at Fergus Falls was erected by Mr. Bell in 1871, and continued to manage the same for a period of fourteen years. About a year ago he took charge of the Central Hotel of this place. Mr. Bell was well and favorably known to the traveling public, and was regarded as one of the best hotel men in the Northwest. He was an honored member of the Masonic fraternity. He leaves a wife and five children—three sons and two daughters—to bitterly grieve at his sudden departure. The people of Willmar extend their sympathy to the bereaved family. The remains will be taken to Rochester, Minn., for interment.
