

F. M. Eddy Interviewed.

Frank M. Eddy, the Republican member of congress from the 7th district of Minnesota, was in town yesterday.

"The fact of the matter is," said Mr. Eddy to the Tribune this afternoon, "that the money question has been discussed so much that the people are getting a little tired of it."

"What do you think the Republican party will say when it meets in state convention regarding the money question?"

"I think there is only one thing for the party to do, that is to face the issue squarely. I believe that will be done when we have declared in favor of an international agreement and pledged the party to use every effort by means of tariff discriminations or what not to bring this about."

"What if that should fail?" "I do not think it will be necessary to take up that contingency at this time. It will take several years for the party to put into effect the policy which it agrees to inaugurate and there is no use crossing a stream until we come to it."

"That is just the point upon which I differ with my friend, Congressman Towne, of Duluth. In his speeches he makes a strong, and, to me, logical argument in favor of international bi-metallism; then, in the last part of his talk he knocks over all he has said, and argues that if we do not succeed in getting an international agreement we can go ahead and establish bi-metallism on our own account, and do it without the panic that the gold men claim will follow. I do not see the wisdom of his position. If we can do what he says we can, without an international agreement, then, it seems to me, it is not necessary to try to get that."

Discussing the presidential aspirations of Senator Davis, Congressman Eddy said that he had no doubt that if Mr. Davis wanted the support of the 7th district he could get it. But he also said that the people of his district had no idea that a presidential nominee would come from Minnesota. Upon the relative strength of the other presidential aspirants Mr. Eddy said that sentiment was far from crystallized. In his opinion the politicians of the 7th district favored McKinley, while the mass of the people were more strongly with Reed. However, he admitted that this was only his impression and that, after all, the matter was in such a chaotic state that it was only a guess. Congressman Eddy is likely to be a candidate for re-election. He said he had held office a good many years, and he felt that he had his full share at the public crib, so that if the Republicans of the seventh district wanted another man in congress he would have no complaint. But, if it was considered that his efforts to redeem the district from the errors of Populism entailed him to a renomination, he would enter the race. As another candidate has been spoken of up to this time, the presumption is that Mr. Eddy will be in the field in 1896.

On the governorship Mr. Eddy said that the sentiment was still very unsettled. All the candidates seemed to have friends, although he said that until he came to Minneapolis he had no idea that R. G. Evans was being talked of for the governorship.
