### An Old Settler Gone.

Noah W. White, one of the oldest settlers in Kandiyohi county, ended his earthly career last Thursday, Sept. 26th, 1895. He was active, and apparently well, to the last moment. He simply sat down in his chair and was gone. Thus peacefully, painlessly, and silently was gathered this ripe sheaf by the universal reaper. Mr. White was well known, and highly respected by all of the people of Kandiyohi county and surrounding district. He was born in the State of New York, Dec. 8th, 1830. He came to Minnesota and what is now Kandiyohi county in 1858. In 1862 he was driven out by the Indians, but came back in 1863. He was married Nov. 30th, 1868 to Alzeda Fuller. Mr. White will be missed by everybody. He was a familiar figure ever and anon on the streets of Willmar. His kind face and white beard will be seen no more. Rest in peace.

### A Great Victory.

Arthur Blackburn, one of the Great Northern strikers, was tried a week ago in the U. S. district court at Minneapolis for obstructing the mail at Willmar, and acquitted.

One thing in particular about the case, and which the readers of the Tribune are deeply interested in, is that S. A. Flaherty, who was formerly county attorney of Stevens county but now of the firm of Spooner & Flaherty, of Minneapolis, conducted the defence. This is quite a victory for Mr. Flaherty, as everybody thought there was no avenue of escape for the defendant, and that he would certainly meet the fate of his companions, Carruthers and Bogart. Mr. Flaherty is making rapid progress in the legal fraternity, and we hope to see him classed among the leading civil and criminal lawyers of the world in the near future.—Morris Tribune.

Dr. Gibson has had about twenty cases of diphtheria to look after since the epidemic broke out at Kandiyohi. Tuesday he had nine calls, eight of which proved to be cases of the disease. He visits his patients every day, and in order to do so travels nearly forty miles. All the cases are doing nicely.—Akwater Press.

There will be a meeting of the patrons of the Willmar Creamery Association next Saturday, Oct. 5th. A full attendance is expected, as the advisability of running the plant this winter will be up for discussion and decision.

J. Edw. Nelson, of Whitefield, gave a party to about a hundred young people at the home of P. N. Nelson last Sunday. A very pleasant time was had. We understand Mr. Nelson has begun a general store business at Svea lately.

The Willmar Mill is now running day and night, and they need all the good milling wheat they can get. Parties needing bran and shorts for the winter will do well to buy now, as later on it will be impossible to supply the demand.

The official census report places the population of Kandiyohi Co. at 16,402. The population in 1890 being 13,997, makes it an increase of 2,405 or 17 per cent. The population in the Seventh Congressional district is placed at 185,983; a gain of 46,070 since the '90 census.

The fall term at the Willmar Seminary commences to-day. At the present writing we can not tell what the attendance will be, but the prospects for the school are very good. The school is widely and favorably known and begins its thirteenth year with a strong faculty and ample facilities for accommodating hundreds of young men and women who may desire a good practical education to help build up the great Northwest.
