### JOHN HENDERSON

Of Green Lake Quietly Passed Away last Sunday at His Old Homestead.

We are called upon again this week to record the death of one of the old and wellknown settlers of Kandiyohi county, John Henderson of Green Lake. Mr. Henderson was born in Pipershire county, Scotland, 67 years ago last August. He emigrated to this country in 1856, settling first in Illinois. He afterward moved to Wisconsin, and in the fall of seventy to Kandiyohi Co., Minnesota where he has resided since.

He was married in 1860 to Isabella Sanderson. Mrs. Henderson and seven children, four sons and three daughters, survive him. The children are Peter, James, John and Hughes, Mrs. A. J. Smithson, Mrs. Dr. Wm. R. Henderson, now of Detroit, Michigan, and Jessie. James is in the drug business at Sunnyside, Washington, and may not be able to reach here in time for the funeral.

John Henderson was well known and highly respected throughout this section of the State. The Henderson homestead is a synonym for hospitality in these parts, and the whole family being not only intellectually superior to the average but especially endowed with that peculiar bon homie so characteristic of the Scot, it has been the Mecca for both young and old for years. Mr. Henderson was, as almost all Scotchlanders are, a good and successful farmer. Fine sheep, horses and cattle were the especial pride of Mr. Henderson. Generous to a fault, honorable in every word, act or transaction, a tender and kind husband and father, and the model farmer in these parts, we may truly say that John Henderson "went to share the holy rest that awaits a life well spent."

His health has been failing for some over a year past. Chronic heart disease finally developed, and at last, nature had to disengage the vital cord. He passed away Oct. 20th, 1895, at 6:30 a. m. The whole community sympathizes with Mrs. Henderson and the bereaved family.

Funeral services occur to-day at 10 o'clock a. m. at the home and interment will take place at Oakeside cemetery, Harrison, Revs. Johnson of Willmar and Handyside of Harrison officiating.
