Gov. Frank A. Day, has the manliness to speak out his convictions:

"That man, Gov. Algeid of Illinois, is to us an enigma. We saw him, we heard him and conversed with him and his charming wife for half an hour in Milwaukee last week, and are free to confess that we have a far better opinion of this much abused personage than we used to have. We introduced Tams Birby to him. Tams remarked in his easy offhand sort of way, 'Governor, I am glad to meet you. From what I had heard about you, I expected to see you wearing horns. I listened to your speech with a great deal of pleasure and interest and am glad I had the opportunity of hearing you talk.' Of the five governors who made addresses at the Milwaukee opera house, Algeid received the largest ovation—in fact when he had finished the crowd went wild with enthusiasm and seemed determined to force the governor to resign. And what he said was profound, philosophical and patriotic. Algeid H. Hall, the well-known Minneapolis criminal lawyer, who sat near us, leaned over and whispered in our ear that Algeid had finished the best speech in the history of Illinois. The strange thing is that the audience was not made up of the so-called common people, but was composed of business and professional men and high officials. I was almost to say that they came to him and remained to applaud. There is surely something about the man that will for years to come make him a prominent figure in the politics of our country."

### Paraffin vs. Transportation.

In some parts of the state there are thousands of acres of the finest potatoes ever raised that will not be dug because there is no paying market for them. Too bad that a hundred thousand poor families in the east cannot get a chance at them.—Montivideo Leader.

This need not and would not be so if railroad managers were more justly disposed. At fair rates to the east it would pay to dig and ship potatoes. As it is, the inordinate greed of the railroads to absorb most of the producer's profits results in a prohibition of shipments; it creates an immense local surplus, rendering potatoes and various other farm products worth in some cases very much less than it costs to raise them, and actually making it profitable to import from foreign countries into the eastern states potatoes large and quantities of onions, cabbages, beans, hay and other like supplies. A prohibitory tariff even would not remedy this. It would only make more absolute the power and opportunity of the railroads.—Albert Lea Standard.

This is a point well taken. It isn't tariff on potatoes that the Western farmer needs, but fair transportation rates. Potatoes are worth 40 to 60 cents per bushel in the eastern states, but high rates of transportation renders it impossible for our farmers to reach this market. The transportation by its excessiveness acts as an export duty levied by the railroads that no import duty can overcome. How long will our western farmers, and the people at large in this county allow themselves to be ground to pieces under this tariff bugaboo? Can they never get a sensible idea into their heads if it doesn't come through their old political party?

Jesse Coxy, son of the commonwealth, wired his mother last week that he sailed that day for Ohio to join the insurgents. What a pity the old man couldn't be induced to do likewise! His title of "general" might be of some service to him. The expedition with him aboard, would have a certainty of getting through. There would be no one willing to stop it.—Season Times.

That remnant of the joy that was among the Danes when Lafayette left France to battle for the independence of this country is now being revived in a pretty much the same way.

### Great Populist Gains.

The Associated Press has again shown its unfairness by refusing to publish the Populist vote, except in isolated instances where it was very small. From what we can gather from other sources we learn that the populists have not lost any ground but have increased at a healthy rate. In Ohio, McKinley's own state, there are to-day not less than 60,000 populists; Coxy's Daily claims 80,000. Kentucky doubled her Populist vote of a year ago, making a number of about 50,000. Iowa holds her own in good shape.

The results are cheering to every thinking friend of reform. The Republicans will be encouraged by their alleged victory over the silver sentiment to come out boldly for the gold standard next year. The democrats are being made to believe that their defeat was due to "monkeying with the soft money craze" and will likely be whipped into line by the administration. Then, what will the poor bi-metalist do? A rupture in the old parties seems inevitable.
