THE PROMISES REALIZED.

Gov. McKinley said in his Massillon speech that the prosperity that would flow to all the people by an endorsement of the republican ticket in Ohio would be felt from one end of the country to the other. A return of this confidence has already been felt by the workmen in his pet institution in Canton. The Dunbar-Hampden Watch Company of Canton notified their men on Wednesday morning (one day after the election, after it was fully known that the people have believed the republican promises), that their wages would be cut 25 per cent and employment given only three days in the week. Over three-fourths of the men were laid off for a week to give the management time to readjust the scale of piece work. The cut means that men employed in the factory who could make under the old wage scale \$15 per week would be employed half time at 75 per cent of their former wages, or \$5.624 per week.—Sound Money.

We say the watch company did serve their men just right. They of course all voted for protection, and will do it again next year, and so on for ever. They lack the instinct of self-preservation, not to speak of manhood. Most of our workmen in large cities and mines have already become simply a piece of automatic machinery. The brain is already gone. They are like a squad of drilled soldiers, who when the officer commands, obey from force of habit. Thus most of our laboring men vote by force of habit just as the boss votes, irrespective of any influence their votes may have on themselves or their fellow men.

Thousands of miners and their families are actually starving in Ohio. Their condition can become no worse than it is. If they had any ambition to better their condition, why didn't they vote for Coxey? To any thinking man any other condition would be better than the one they are in at present. But their thinking capacity, if they ever had any, is evidently gone.

We need not think that the factory hand or coal miner will help save this country. If it is saved the farmer must do it, and the West must do it.
