Commissioners' Proceedings.

Auditor's Office, March 11th, 1896.

The board of county commissioners met in special session at 2 o'clock p. m. pursuant to call. Present: Flygare, Skoglund, Norin, Johnson and Lofgren. The matter of reappropriation of a county road in the S. E. corner of Sec. 3, Town 117, Range 33, was under consideration. G. J. Bjornburg was present and was given a hearing in the matter. Upon looking up the records for 1887 it was found that there has been a mistake made in the notice to supervisors to open said road. It was upon motion decided that the auditor be instructed to notify the supervisors of East Lake Lillian, to open said road according to commissioners order establishing said road. Petition of P. A. Berglund to be set off from School Dist. No. 43 to Dist. No. 83 was presented, read and on motion set for hearing at the next regular meeting of the board.

Petitions of Wm. Wheeler and C. Homebrink to be set off from School Dist. No. 3 to Dist. No. 32, and petition of John DeFoe to be set off from School Dist. No. 37 to District No. 32, were presented, read and on motion set for hearing at the next regular meeting of the board.

On motion the board adjourned till 9 o'clock a. m. Mar. 12.

MARCH 12TH.
The Board met at 9 o'clock a. m. All members present.

A petition for county road, under Chapter 302, Laws of 1895, from West section corner of Sec. 2, Town 119, R. 35, to the north end of Nelson's avenue in the Village of Willmar, signed by 148 Real Estate owners was presented, read and upon motion accepted. Together with the petition was an agreement, from the Real Estate owners of Town of Willmar and Dove north of Foot Lake, donating 119 days' work with man and team and fifty dollars cash, to be applied on the road provided it is established. A bond provided for in said Chapter 302 was also given for free right of way and free dirt and stone for filling.

On motion the following viewers were appointed: Commissioners, Flygare, Martin Olson, Atwater, and A. J. Smithson, Roseville.
