**NORSEMAN OF MINNESOTA.**  
 And the Unveiling of the Ole Bull Monument.  
 The Norsemen of Minneapolis gathered by thousands at Minneapolis to honor the memory of two of their distinguished compatriots Ole Bull, the great violinist, whom all the world loved and honored, and Jacob Fjelde, who had completed the magnificent marble statue elected to be an everlasting memento of the great musician, and then yielded up his own life, almost on the eve of the day when his countrymen were to gather and do him honor.  
 A more fitting time for the unveiling of the statue could not have been selected, for it was the day that all sons of Norway celebrate, the anniversary of Norway's release from Danish rule. The great exposition building was crowded to the doors.  
 The singing contest, which was to be the great feature of the occasion, was between nine societies, embracing the Swedish, Norwegian and German nationalities, and while the patriotism of the listeners was responsible for a large amount of applause, this was scarcely more enthusiastic than that from the thousands of people in the hall, who applauded simply because they appreciated good music.  
 The Danes orchestra opened the programme with Greig's "Spring." Agnes Staberg-Hall followed with Gonnod's waltz, "Romeo et Juliette." Then came the Orpheus society of Minneapolis, and rendered Lindblad's "Heart and Nature," the Svenska Sangerne of St. Paul, with "Shepherd's Sabbath Song." Following these came the other societies of both cities, with music of the highest order, much of it from Scandinavian composers.  
 The orchestra rendered Greig's beautiful composition, "Heartwounds," and at its conclusion John W. Arctander spoke very briefly and asked the audience not to applaud but to rise as a testimonial of sorrow and regard for the dead, when the statue had been unveiled.  
 Then followed a scene which those in the audience will never forget. As the great audience rose, there floated through the building the beautiful strains of Ole Bull's "Chalet Girl's Sunday." The audience remained in perfect silence with bowed heads until the last strains of the orchestra had died away, when Miss Caroline Boeckman of St. Paul stepped forward and pulled the cord which removed the veil from Fjelde's masterpiece.  
 The unveiling of the statue was followed by the oration of the day, delivered by Ignatius Donnelly.  
 As a relief from the solemnity of the occasion, which became somewhat of a strain, Agnes Staberg-Hall sang "L'Africaine," and the quick movement of the air restored the spirits of the audience.  
 In conclusion, Frank Nyo paid a brief but eloquent tribute to the memory of Fjelde, and the great audience filed out.
