**MINNESOTA FOLK GOLD.**  
Special to the Minneapolis Journal. St. Louis, June 15—The Minnesota delegation this morning came out strong for a declaration in favor of the maintenance of the gold standard. They instructed ex-Gov. Merriam, the representative of Minnesota on the committee on resolutions to insert on a straight gold plank and pledged the 78 votes of the delegation in the convention to stand by him to the end. Representative Chas. A. Towne of Minnesota is infuriated over the declaration of the delegation and openly declares that in case a gold plank is placed in the platform he will stump the state for silver.
