MINNESOTA POPULISTS.

State Convention at Minneapolis Largely Attended and Very Enthusiastic.

Endorsed Democratic Nominations and Filled Vacancies on the Ticket.

Bowler for Lieutenant Governor and Keys for Attorney General.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 27.—Fusion was the war cry in the state convention of the People's party. The Democratic candidates for state offices were endorsed, and the Populists themselves filled in the vacant places according to the programme mapped out by the conference committee some days ago. J. M. Bowler of Bird Island was nominated for lieutenant governor and J. A. Keyes of Duluth for attorney general. The electoral ticket was completed by the selection of James Dillon, at large, St. Paul; Thomas J. Meighan, First district; Sylvester Kelliker, Fifth district; and H. J. Bjorge, Seventh district.

There was absolute harmony at all times in the convention, and the rumors of a bolt on the part of the anti-Owen faction were without foundation. Ignatius Donnelly was heard from but twice during the day and both times his voice was for peace.

Attendance Was Large. Harmonia hall was well filled when the convention was called to order at 10 a. m., fully 800 delegates being in attendance, while the gallery was filled with spectators. The morning session was brief, and after the appointment of committees a recess was taken till afternoon.

When the convention reassembled the committee on permanent organization reported in favor of making the temporary organization permanent, and the report was adopted. Pending the report of the committee on resolutions the nomination of state officers was taken up, and S. M. Owen appeared on the platform and made a speech nominating John Lind for governor. The nomination was made unanimously, and Mr. Lind was escorted to the platform and thanked the convention for the honor conferred.

Other Nominations.

When nominations for lieutenant governor were called for George N. Lamphere of Moorhead, J. M. Bowler of Bird Island, D. F. Aiken of Dakota county, W. R. Prendergast of St. Paul of Paul, J. I. Vernylaea of Fillmore county, R. J. Hall of Stevens and J. T. Caton of Minneapolis were named. The first ballot was without result, Bowler leading with 318 votes. Caton had 193, Lamphere 116 and the others were scattered. On the second ballot, when it became apparent that Major Bowler would be the nominee, the roll call was suspended and the nomination made unanimous. J. A. Keyes of Duluth was then placed in nomination for attorney general and he was selected by acclamation. The electors were then chosen as given above.

The Resolutions.

The report of the committee on resolutions endorsed the St. Louis platform and candidates; demands the enforcement of the laws, the election of the board of railway commissioners by the people, the taxation of railway lands, the repeal of the struck jury law and the retrenchment in the expenditures of the state, county and city governments. It concludes as follows: "We condemn the gold standard political organization and its corporate allies in their systematic intimidation of employees and other voters as a menace to free government, and we pledge the protection of our party to all citizens in the free exercise of the electoral franchise."
