President of Atwater Creamery Company.

Frederick C. Peterson, of whom we have the pleasure this week to present a likeness to our readers, was born at Eyon, Denmark, June 12, 1857. He came to this country in 1877. He worked eight years as stationary engineer at Atwater and Fisher. In 1881 he purchased the farm he now owns and manages, 2 1/2 miles south of Atwater. Being of a mechanical turn of mind, he has erected a large, old-fashioned windmill, with canvas sails, for feed grinding, which has become an old landmark in his neighborhood. In the creamery enterprise at Atwater, which began in January, 1891, he has taken a lively interest, and in 1893 was elected president of the company and is still serving as such, this being his fourth year. Mr. Peterson has served the town of Genesee as supervisor three years, 1878, and held positions on the board of his school district, etc. Mr. Peterson is a type of the rugged, staunch yeomanry for which this country is indebted to the Scandinavian countries.
