RAILROAD NEWS.

Guy Porter has completed painting switch targets and has returned to Willmar.

Chas. Hardy has secured a position as express messenger and is running between St. Cloud and Sandstone.

Frank Donaldson, who has been visiting his parents at Litchfield, returned last Wednesday and will resume work again.

Albert Englund, who has been confined to his room the past month with rheumatic fever, is now able to be out again.

Messrs E. Shesgreen, Geo. Ross, R. Dorn, of St. Paul, and Ed Shesgreen, of Willmar, spent Sunday fishing at Green Lake.

Superintendent Bowron and Roadmaster Myers left, Thursday night, for a general inspecting trip over the entire Breckenridge division.

Frank Russell, the popular night yardmaster at Breckenridge, passed through Willmar, one day last week, on his way home from Minneapolis.

The sum of \$498,000 was paid out by the Great Northern railway as wages to employes on the Breckenridge division during the last fiscal year.

There are at the present time employed on the Great Northern, north of the Breckenridge division, nearly 1,300 extra men. Seven steam shovels are also doing duty.

On account of a bad washout on the "Soo" road, last Wednesday, the regular passenger train on that line came from Paynesville here and thence to St. Paul over the Great Northern.

Last Tuesday evening there was a wreck on the Great Northern, about a mile east of St. Joseph. Charles Washburn, a son of F. H. Washburn, yardmaster at St. Cloud, was riding on the freight and was killed. The engineer and fireman were slightly hurt.

George Emerson, formerly foreman of the Barnesville shops, takes the place of Bruce as master mechanic.

The "Soo" and the G. N. depots, at Hankinson, were burglarized Wednesday night. The "Soo" lost nothing, the G. N. lost \$250, and the loss, unfortunately, will fall on the agent.

Master Mechanic Bruce's resignation has at last been accepted and he will probably go to running again. He has many friends, who regret to see him go out, as he was efficient and just in his work.
