 Mathilda Wilhelmina Skoglund, the wife of Peter Skoglund, died at her home at Lake Andrew Saturday, Nov. 20th, at an age of 27 years, 10 months and 5 days, from a complication of diseases, after an illness of over a year.
 The deceased was born in Vester-gotland, Sweden, Jan. 15, 1870. Her maiden name was Ahlberg. She married Peter Skoglund April 16, 1888. Besides the sorrowing husband, the deceased leaves four children—one boy eight years of age and three girls aged one, four and six years respectively; also her parents and three brothers and three sisters. The sympathy of all goes out to the grief-stricken husband and small motherless children in the irreparable loss they have suffered.
 The funeral took place Wednesday and the remains were interred in the Lake Florida cemetery, Rev. N. Frykman officiating.

Chas. H. Blakely died of consumption last Tuesday at his home in Lintonville, aged 29 years. Mr. Blakely was a son of Hugh Blakely, of Roseville, and was well known in this city and vicinity, and his wife is a daughter of Mr. K. Feddema of Lintonville. We understand that Mr. Blakely's first illness was caused by a grippe, which finally resulted in consumption. He leaves a wife and two little girls, aged respectively 1 and 3 years, also a father, mother, 3 brothers and six sisters. Chas. H. Blakely was born in the Town of Roseville, near this city, in the year 1868, and lived with his parents until 5 or 6 years ago, when he was married and later opened a blacksmith shop at Lintonville, where he resided up to the time of his death. The funeral was held from the Lake Henry Catholic church, last Thursday, Rev. Father Lange being the officiating clergyman.
