The new creamery of the Hub Dairy Association of the Towns of Dove, Green Lake and New London, located near Henderson's place in Green Lake, began operation yesterday. The TRIBUNE predicts that this enterprise will come to the front as one of the most successful creameries of the county in the near future.

The Central Minnesota Picnic Association, which includes a number of Woodmen lodges located in Central Minnesota, is making arrangements to hold a picnic this year at Spring Park, Lake Minnetonka, on June 8th. A special train will leave Willmar early in the morning, and cheap rates will be offered. A number of Woodmen from this place are planning to attend.

The friends of Mrs. A. N. Gray (nee Petra Gjems) will be pained to learn of her death, which occurred at her home in St. Paul the 16th inst, after an illness of some weeks. Deceased had not been married long, and the blow is a very sad one for her husband. The remains were interred in the family burial place at Decorah, Iowa, to rest beside her father.

Andrew Bjorsell has secured the contract for building the factory of the Willmar Gasoline Engine Works. The structure will be a two-story one, 40x60 feet, fitted with offices, etc. A definite location has not yet been decided upon. There are two sites in view, one being at the west end of the railroad yards, in the First ward, and the other at the east end, on the S. S. Glarum property.

A meeting of the Christian men of the village was held at the M. E. church Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. After devotional services the question of organizing a Y. M. C. A. was brought up. There was a general feeling expressed by those present of the advisability of such a movement, and a committee composed of one representative from each church was selected to make preliminary arrangements. Another meeting will be held next Sunday afternoon.

The postal department will establish mail service between Willmar and Olivia. The route will be via Svea, Roseland and Winfield. The time of the departure and arrival of mails will be as follows: Leave Willmar on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, at 8 a. m., arriving at Olivia about 4:30 p. m. Leave Olivia Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, at 8 a. m., arriving at Willmar about 4:30 p. m. The department is now advertising for sealed proposals for such service. The establishment of such a route will be of great benefit, as hitherto all mail from here to Roseland and points further south has had to go via Minneapolis.

THE BOYS IN BLUE.

Memorial Day to be Observed in Willmar in a Fitting Manner.

Arrangements are being made by Col. Heg Post, No. 125, G. A. R., for a proper observance of Memorial Day, and Commander Patton of the Post informs us that the following program has been arranged for:

On Sunday, May 29th, at 3 p. m., memorial services will be held at St. Luke's church to be conducted by Rev. Booth. The veterans will attend in a body, and the public is also cordially invited.

On Monday, May 30th, at 9 a. m., the veterans will meet at the store of Comrade Boyd and proceed from there to the cemeteries to decorate with flowers and evergreens the graves of the eight comrades who have passed beyond. Ladies of Willmar who have flowers that they would like to spare for this purpose are requested to leave them at Mr. Boyd's store before 9 a. m. on the 30th.

At 1:30 p. m. the members of Col. Heg Post, the Sons of Veterans, and the members of Capt. Spicer's company will meet at the court house, and march from thence to the high school building, where the school children will fall in. The line of march will be as follows: school house to Fourth street; north on Fourth street to Pacific avenue; west on Pacific avenue to Fifth street; south on fifth street to Litchfield avenue; thence west to the park. The speakers of the afternoon will be Hon. A. F. Nordin, Dr. Christian Johnson and Mr. Roy E. Sperry. There will be singing appropriate to the day by the school children.

Should the weather be unfavorable, the exercises will be held at the court house instead of at the park.

It is earnestly hoped that the people generally of Willmar will co-operate with Col. Heg Post to make the proposed observances worthy of the day.
